Where are we going?

The question was asked during the last meeting, "Where are we going? What are we doing?"

These questions were asked because there seems to be an absence of members attending the meetings. History shows that the Association was strongest about a year after we reformed in April of 1998. Everybody had high hopes then that we would attract all the younger members of the Corps and be able to have at least four functions per year to increase the sense of camaraderie between us all. Sadly, this did not happen. In fact, in the past three years we have had to cancel two Corps Birthday Dinners because of lack of numbers.

The Association stands to serve the members of the Corps, both still serving and retired. While the younger members are still ten-foot tall and bullet proof we understand that their catch cry is, "What's in it for me?" The As-

sociation is aimed at the Welfare of all members and we have trained Welfare Officers to do this work. The scenario of Welfare for the younger members is the same as the old n' bold. What if you get hurt whilst on duty? Can you navigate your way through the maze of paperwork required to seek medical services or compensation? Our Welfare Officers are all trained to fill out all the forms for you and to follow you case to its natural conclusion. The youngest member that was represented was just 18 years of age. By his own admission, he would not have succeeded had he applied on his own. After one of our Welfare Officers took his case on, he now has a pension and compensation for the injuries that found his service career over virtually before it began. Our Welfare Officers can assist you with matters from the Department of Veteran's Affairs (for those with overseas Active Service), the Military Compensation and Rehabilitation Service, and, the Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Scheme. This service to our members is entirely without cost.

What else can the Association offer?

For the older members, not only help as above, but also help to find the right services that you may need to keep your life on track and comfortable. We can even arrange help for you in the garden if you need it. Most of the older members appreciate getting together with other members of the Corps, serving or discharged, just to compare notes. This way they keep up with the system and maintain their interest in the Corps. The younger members can also benefit from the old n' bold. You can gain a terrific amount of knowledge from just talking to each other. We have members from the Corps of REME (British Army) who enjoy talking to those in another military system. From these members, it is very easy to get another outlook on our common problems. All this can happen by just attending a meeting.

In short, the Association can help you, no matter what age, to build on the "Esprit de Corps" that began with your training before you even joined RAEME.

Nominee No. 2: [Kalamazoo Gazette]: James Burns, 34, (a mechanic) of Alamo, MI, was killed in March as he was trying to repair what police describe as a "farm-type truck." Burns got a friend to drive the truck on a highway while Burns hung underneath so that he could ascertain the source of a troubling noise. Burns' clothes caught on something, however, and the other man found Burns "wrapped in the drive shaft."

Nominee No. 3: [Hickory Daily Record]: Ken Charles Barger, 47, accidentally shot himself to death in December in Newton, NC. Awakening to the sound of a ringing telephone beside his bed, he reached for the phone but grabbed instead a Smith & Wesson 38 Special, which discharged when he drew it to his ear.

Nominee No. 4: [UPI, Toronto]: Police said a lawyer demonstrating the safety of windows in a downtown Toronto skyscraper crashed through a pane with his shoulder and plunged 24 floors to his death. A police spokesman said Garry Hoy, 39, fell into the courtyard of the Toronto Dominion Bank Tower early Friday evening as he was explaining the strength of the building's windows to visiting law students. Hoy previously has conducted demonstrations of window strength according to police reports. Peter Lawson, managing partner of the firm Holden Day. Wilson, told the Toronto Sun newspaper that Hoy was "one of the best and brightest" members of the 200-man association.

Nominee No. 5: [The News of the Weird]: Michael Anderson Godwin made News of the Weird posthumously. He had spent several years awaiting South Carolina's electric chair on a murder conviction before having his sentence reduced to life in prison. While sitting on a metal toilet in his cell attempting to fix his small TV set, he bit into a wire and was electrocuted.

Nominee No. 6: [The Indianapolis Star]: A cigarette lighter may have triggered a fatal explosion in Dunkirk, IN. A Jay County man, using a cigarette lighter to check the barrel of a muzzleloader, was killed Monday night when the weapon discharged in his face, sheriff's investigators said. Gregory David Pryor, 19, died in his parents' Dunkirk home at about 11:30 PM. Investigators said Pryor was cleaning a 54-calibre muzzle-loader that had not been firing properly. He was using the lighter to look into the barrel when the gunpowder ignited.

Nominee No. 7: [Reuters, Massasauga, Ontario]: A man cleaning a bird feeder on the balcony of his condominium apartment in this Toronto suburb slipped and fell 23 stories to his death. Stefan Macko, 55, was standing on a wheeled chair when the accident occurred, said Inspector D'Arcy Honer of the Peel Regional Police. "It appears that the chair moved, and he went over the balcony." Honer said.

Finally, THE WINNER!!!: [Arkansas Democrat Gazette]: Two local men were injured when their pickup truck left the road and struck a tree near Cotton Patch on State Highway 38 early Monday. Woodruff County deputy Dovey Snyder reported the accident shortly after midnight Monday, Thurston Poole, 33, of Des Arc, and Billy Ray Wallis, 38, of Little Rock, were returning to Des Arc after a frog gigging trip. On an overcast Sunday night, Poole's pickup truck headlights malfunctioned.

The two men concluded that the head-light fuse on the older-model truck had burned out. As a replacement fuse was not available, Wallis noticed that the 22-calibre bullet from his pistol fit perfectly into the fuse box next to the steering-wheel column. Upon inserting the bullet the headlights again began to operate properly, and the two men proceeded on eastbound toward the White River Bridge. After travelling ap-

Enlisted: Jan 1953 Discharged: April 1975

Dick was an 8th intake Apprentice, Vehicle Mechanic, allocated to the Corps of the Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers [RAEME] and serving the first 3 years at Balcombe Army Apprentice School in Victoria. He served there from Jan 1953 to Dec 1955.

He was then posted to Melbourne Area Workshops, from Dec 1955 to Feb 1962. He completed the 4th year of his apprenticeship here and was detached for short periods of time to 1 Medium Wksps and 3 Base Wksps.

During this posting he managed to complete all his corps qualifying courses at RAEME Training Centre, and was promoted to CPL.

Do not think for a moment that all his time at Melbourne Area Wksps was devoted to his army career. During this period that not only did he meet, but won the heart and married the love of his life "Alice". Early in 1962 he was posted to Pucka Area Wksps until 1963. On the posting he was promoted to SGT. Due to his out-standing service up to date, he was offered a posting to Papua New Guinea and as it included taking his family, he accepted. So from Nov 1963 until mid 1967, Dick was posted to Papua New Guinea Workshops. After almost four years of outstanding devotion to his duties he was offered, for the first time since joining the Army, a posting back to his home State of Western Australia, and, surprise, surprise, it was accepted. Mid 1967 to Oct 1968 he was posted to 5 BOD WA. Here Dick was given a married quarter to settle his family in as well as being promoted to Warrant Officer Class 2. The posting did not last long for, in Oct 1968 he was asked to go to Vietnam and needless to say, being the soldier he was, he could never refuse to go where his service was required. In Oct 1968 he said his farewells to his family and joined his new unit, 106 Field Workshops. His posting to 106 Field Workshops was from Oct 1968 to Oct 1969. As part of the 106 FD WKSPS advance party, Dick set about preparing the area for the arrival of the remainder of the unit.

As in all his previous posting, Dick carried-out his duties in Vietnam to the highest possible standard not only bringing credit to himself, but to his unit and the Corps as a whole.On return to Australia, Dick was posted to 2 Sigs Regiment, Victoria. He arrived at 2 Sigs Regiment in Oct of 1969 and had a relatively short stay when he was again posted in Jan 1970. Firstly, Dick had moved the family back to Victoria and then settled back into the normal every day unit life.

Again his effort was of such a high standard that in Jan 1970 he was again posted, on promotion to Warrant Officer Class 1. This time it was back to

Melbourne Area Wksps as the Artificer Sergeant Major, [ASM]. He held this posting from Jan 1970 to Jun 1973. This was the first time I had worked in the same unit as Dick. It was not long before I came to realise that his reputation was well deserved and he was, in fact, a credit to the Corps.It was a sorry day for the unit when Dick was posted back to WA because of his father's ongoing illness. In Jun 1973 he was posted back to Perth Workshop Company. This post he held until his separation from the Army in Apr 1975. Dick was kept busy as the ASM of the unit. All this while he was settling his family in married quarters and then into the new home they had bought at Mundaring. Dick's life was very busy as he was doing all he could for his parents at the same time. In Apr 1975 he came to the conclusion it was impossible for him to give his best to both his family and the Army. So he decided to take his discharge and it was then that the Army lost one of it's most devoted members.

New Tanks For Australian Army Roll Off Production Line In United States

The first five of the Australian Army's new Abrams tanks have rolled off the production line in the United States today.

Army has ordered 59 of the rebuilt tanks officially designated the Abrams M1A1, Abrams Integrated Management (AIM).

A ceremony marking the occasion was held in Lima, Ohio, at the Joint Services Manufacturing Centre and was attended by Australian Defence Organisation representatives.

This is the first major delivery under Australia's Foreign Military Sales program with the United States. These tanks will now be transported to Fort Hood, Texas, in preparation for the training of Australian tank soldiers and maintainers as they convert to the new vehicle.

The Abrams M1A1 AIM tanks will replace the current Leopard AS1 tank and will provide the Army with increased firepower, mobility and survivability for soldiers on the battlefield.

This tank will form a key component of the 'Hardened and Networked' Army announced by the Government last year.

Funding for these tanks has been provided as part of the Government's com-

mitment to spending \$28 1/2 billion on defence capability over the 10-year period to 2010.

This funding builds on the 2000 White Paper commitment to increase Defence funding by three per cent annually until 2010/11.

The Abrams ensures that if we have to deploy our forces on close combat operations they will have the combat weight they need to achieve their mission without undue risk.

All tanks procured under this project have been rebuilt under the Abrams Integrated Management program.

The AIM program applies modifications and technology improvements to the M1A1 tank to ensure that it will serve to 2020 and beyond.

The comprehensive rebuild process means the tanks have embedded diagnostics and digitalisation plus a range of armour, firepower, automotive and engine improvements.

The modification process for the Australian tanks began in June 2005 when the 59 Australian-selected M1A1 tanks were transferred to the Anniston Army Depot, Alabama, where they were stripped to their component parts. The upgrade and technology enhancement process takes place at the Joint Services Manufacturing Centre, Lima, Ohio.

The delivery of these new capabilities is proceeding to schedule and demonstrates the close cooperation occurring between Defence Materiel Organisation and Army.

The Abrams will be introduced into Army training schools in Australia in late 2006. It will be fielded in Darwin by mid-2007.

New heavy airlift capability for the Royal Australian Air Force

The Australian Government will acquire up to four new Boeing C-17

Globemaster III aircraft and associated equipment to provide the Australian Defence Force (ADF) with a heavy airlift capability.

The Government has selected the C-17 by for its ability to meet the needs of the ADF over the next 30 years.

This is the only aircraft currently in production which has a proven capability to meet ADF operational commitments, in Australia, the region and globally. The C-17 has four times the carrying capacity of the RAAF C-130 Hercules.

The C-17 aircraft has the load capacity and range that will allow the ADF to rapidly deploy troops, combat vehicles, heavy equipment and helicopters. This includes the M1A1 Abrams Tank, as well as Black Hawk, Sea Hawk, and Chinook helicopters. Each C-17 has the capacity to transport five Bushmaster Infantry Vehicles, or three Tiger helicopters.

The fleet of up to four aircraft will give Australia a new Responsive Global AirLift (RGA) capability, significantly enhancing the ADF's ability to support national and international operations, and major disaster rescue and relief efforts.

As the C-17 aircraft is currently in production, it is possible for the first aircraft to be delivered later this year with the balance of the fleet to be delivered by mid 2008. This will give the ADF the Responsive Global Airlift operating capability it needs within a short time-frame.

Acquisition of the C-17 will also provide significant opportunity for our aerospace industry with Boeing proposing an Australian Industry Capability program valued at \$345m over the life of the aircraft.

Based at the Fremantle Artillery Barracks, the WA Army Museum has achieved national recognition as a premier military museum. Our primary needs are for weekend gallery attendants and weekday guides for school tours. Opportunities also exist in other areas of the museum.

Government To Improve Army's Firepower

The Government has provided first pass approval for the replacement of Army's current 105mm and 155mm artillery pieces with new, more capable, artillery systems under a project known as LAND 17.

Defence will now develop the project which invests in artillery systems with longer range, improved precision, and better crew protection.

Options for replacing the current towed artillery pieces include a mix of protected self-propelled artillery systems, and lightweight towed artillery systems.

As an additional benefit, the project will also examine advanced high precision munitions and a networked command and fire control system.

LAND 17 will give the Army a very potent and accurate land-based firepower capability.

The project is another example of the Government's ongoing commitment to providing the ADF with enhanced fire-power to meet current and emerging threats in complex war fighting environments.

The implementation of LAND 17 supports the Government's strategy for a Hardened and Networked Army (HNA).

LAND 17 will make the combined arms groups being developed under HNA more capable and versatile, by providing them with improved firepower, extended range, greater mobility and accuracy.

The capability is an important contributor to the requirements set out in the Defence 2000 White Paper; by providing sustained investment in land force capabilities; and by supporting the ADF's capacity to sustain a brigade deployed on operations for extended periods whilst maintaining at least a battalion group available for deploy

ment elsewhere

Defence has been working closely with industry and the Department plans to release an open Request for Tender later this year, to identify companies that can provide artillery systems with the level of capability sought.

The new system would be brought into service over the period 2011-2013 at a total cost of between \$450 million and \$600 million.

Once in service, the new artillery pieces will be used to re-equip units based in Darwin, Townsville, Brisbane and the Combined Arms Training Centre in Puckapunyal, Victoria.

ADF 'Ready' to Support the Commonwealth Games

The Australian Defence Force (ADF) is

providing approximately 2,600 people, along with a range of equipment, to support both security and non-security aspects of the 2006 Melbourne Commonwealth Games being held in Melbourne from March 15 to 26.

"This is an activity that Defence is very proud to be involved with," said Chief of the Defence Force, Air Chief Marshal Angus Houston. "We want to ensure that Australia stages a safe, secure and successful event for the athletes and public to enjoy."

Defence tasks will include specialist ceremonial and general support, as well as assisting the Victoria Police search venues, operate vehicle checkpoints, respond to bomb threats and clear waterways.

Defence's commitment will include Blackhawk helicopters and a detachment of F/A 18 Hornet fighters, specialised search teams, special forces, and ships from the Royal Australian Navy. The ships and aircraft will be able to divert aircraft and intercept vessels at sea to counter specific threats should they arise.

The ADF will also provide personnel to assist venue managers in coordinating communications at Commonwealth Games venues and precincts.

Air Chief Marshal Houston emphasised the ADF's supporting role during the Games: "I want to stress that the Victorian Government, and Victoria Police in particular, are responsible for security at the Games. The ADF's job is to provide specialised support to the Victorian Police, as well as support to the Attorney-General's Department under the Commonwealth's standing arrangements for counter-terrorism if that is required".

Once again, Reservists from the Navy, Army and Air Force will play key roles in the ADF's supporting task force by providing an additional layer to complement other ADF domestic security capabilities. "I am pleased to see Reserves taking a full part in this operation," ACM Houston said.

"Some of these troops are part of the Reserve Response Forces that were established two years ago as part of the Government's commitment to securing Australia against the threat of terrorism. Their contribution to the Melbourne Games will include assisting the Victorian Police with tasks such as searching venues and operating vehicle checkpoints, showing just how versatile Australia's Reserve forces are."

Air Chief Marshal Houston also congratulated the newly-appointed commander of the ADF's joint task force for the Games, Brigadier Andrew Smith. "Brigadier Smith is very experienced in this type of operation, having played an important role in the ADF's support to the Sydney Olympics. I wish him, and all of his troops, the very best for this operation."

Army Battalion To Relocate To Adelaide

Army's 3rd Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment (3RAR) will relocate from Sydney to Adelaide as part of the Hardened and Networked Army strategy, Defence Minister Robert Hill announced recently.

"The Government has agreed in principle to relocate 3 RAR from its current base at Holsworthy Barracks in Sydney to the Edinburgh Defence precinct in Adelaide," Senator Hill said.

"Approximately 1200 personnel from 3 RAR and supporting elements will be relocated to form a new Mechanised Battlegroup.

"Whilst 3 RAR will form the core of the Battlegroup, 'A' Field Battery in Sydney and some personnel from 1 Combat Engineer Regiment and 1 Combat Service Support Battalion in Darwin will also be relocated. There

will be no net loss in the numbers of personnel in Darwin, as other units will expand as part of the Hardened and Networked Army strategy.

"The Adelaide Mechanised Battlegroup will be established from 2011 with personnel relocating in that year once the construction of the necessary facilities has been completed."

The decision to relocate to Adelaide follows an examination of basing options undertaken by Defence. It determined that on the basis of the capability benefits of access to transport, training facilities and deep maintenance support. Adelaide was the best option.

It also provided respite postings and an attractive location for Defence personnel and their families.

Senator Hill said Adelaide has good access to the Cultana Training Area and other training areas in the Centre and North of Australia via the new Darwin to Adelaide rail link. Importantly, this training can be easily combined with other mechanised elements from the 1st Brigade in Darwin, further lifting the Army's capability.

"Having mechanised battalions in both Northern and Southern Australia will allow rotations from tropical conditions during a soldier's service. It will also allow a greater range of locations for soldiers to be posted to around Australia.

"The movement of personnel to Adelaide will be undertaken as part of the normal cycle of postings so as to provide minimal disruption to soldiers and their families."

As part of the Hardened and Networked Army strategy 3 RAR will also be reroled from a parachute battalion to generate a second mechanised battlegroup.

The battalion will receive M113 Armoured Personnel Carriers and Bushmaster Infantry Mobility vehicles, and will be structured identical to 5/7

Veterans Struggle to Combat Depression

By Matthew Benns February 12, 2006

The death of a war veteran who killed himself after he was turned away by a veterans' hospital has inspired his fellow diggers to set up their own counselling line.

The move comes as details of a new study leaked to The Sun-Herald showed that the suicide rate among war veterans was four times higher than in the rest of the population.

Former soldier Bill Edwards started the helpline after attending the funeral of a fellow Vietnam veteran who killed himself after being told there were no beds at a Department of Veterans' Affairs hospital in Queensland.

"There were about 100 of us sitting at his funeral and my wife said to me, 'Isn't it sad that we are all here for him today and he didn't know to contact us'," Mr Edwards said.

He resolved to set up a contact list of former soldiers, so that other veterans would have someone to call at their time of greatest need.

Veterans were also angry that specialised telephone counselling was not available 24 hours a day.

"Unfortunately the DVA [Department of Veterans' Affairs] counselling number switches over to a helpline for the general public at night and it is not adequate," Mr Edwards said.

Vietnam veteran Ross Horne, NSW secretary of the Royal Australian Regiment, said: "People are killing themselves because they are not getting the proper help.

"I have been refused help by the Vietnam Veterans Counselling Service. It is not only the veterans who are suffering but their families as well."

Vietnam Veterans Federation national president Tim McCombe said the new study showed the suicide rate among former soldiers was now 200 per cent higher than in the rest of the population. And he said the suicide that inspired the diggers to set up their own helpline was "an outrage".

A spokesman for the Department of Veterans' Affairs confirmed the afterhours counselling service for veterans and their families was provided by trained staff at Salvo Care and was paid for by the Australian Government.

"Veterans Line has been a highly successful service and the Department is satisfied with the support being provided to veterans calling after hours."

A Soldier's Tale......

A young soldier who was serving in World War 2 had just returned from several weeks of intense action on the front line.

On arriving at Southampton Docks, he disembarked the troop ship he had sailed on and boarded a busy London train bound for a few days leave.

As the train was very crowded, the sol-

ber, occupied a fire position under extreme ACM fire with the intent to suppress the ACM. This action enabled the Australian element to regain the initiative and was pivotal in preventing loss of life on the south eastern sector of the contact site. It also enabled further elements to move into positions to prevent an ACM advance and to facilitate the withdrawal of the Australian patrol from the engagement area.

Sergeant "Y's" actions of gallantry and disregard for his own safety in order to reinforce the main force element and his ability to recover a machine gun in order to suppress the ACM, while under fire in extremely hazardous circumstances, displayed courage of the highest order and is keeping with the finest traditions of the Australian Army and the Australian Defence Force.

WARRANT OFFICER CLASS TWO 'Z' TO BE AWARDED THE MEDAL FOR GALLANTRY

For Gallantry, as a Patrol Commander, while under intense Anti-Coalition Militia (ACM) fire and showing total disregard for his own safety he attempted on three occasions to recover a critically wounded Afghanistan National Army soldier.

During the conduct of an Operation in southern Afghanistan an Australian patrol was engaged by a numerically superior ACM element. In the lead up to this engagement WO2 "Z" was tasked. by the on-scene commander, to conduct a foot patrol to clear and secure a potentially dangerous obstacle in order to facilitate the safe passage of the Australian patrol. Whilst conducting this task WO2 "Z" commenced to secure the south-eastern sector of the obstacle choke point. In doing so, WO2 "Z" and an Afghanistan National Army soldier, were engaged by ACM at close range. This engagement resulted in the critical wounding of the ANA soldier. The decisive reaction of WO2 "Z" contributed to the early initiation of the

ACM ambush which in turn prevented the remainder of the Australian element from entering the ambush killing ground.

The Australian patrol then became engaged in a sustained fire fight with the ACM for several hours. During this time WO2 "Z" made three attempts to recover the critically wounded ANA soldier whilst still under extremely heavy fire from numerous enemy positions. Unfortunately. the critically wounded ANA soldier died of his wounds before he could be recovered. WO2 "Z's" actions of gallantry and disregard for his own safety in attempting to rescue his fallen comrade in extremely hazardous circumstances displayed courage of the highest order and is in keeping with the finest traditions of the Australian Army and the Australian Defence Force.

Start Of \$3 Billion Investment In Trucks And Trailers To 'Harden' The Army

The first major phase of a \$3 billion investment in Army's fleet of field vehicles has been released as a part of the Government's Hardening and Networking the Army strategy, Defence Minister Robert Hill announced today.

Senator Hill said three separate Requests for Tender (RFT) have been released today to replace a vital fleet of Army trucks, four-wheel drives, trailers and modules for Army's high readiness units.

The investment is part of Project Overlander - the largest land project in the Defence Capability Plan worth a total of \$3 billion.

This current phase is worth up to \$600 million and includes replacing the existing high readiness fleet of about 1400 heavy and light vehicles, 1300 trailers and 1200 specialist modules. The next phase will replace the rest of Army's vehicles, trailers and modules across Australia.

Project Overlander is a key part of the Government's Hardening and Networking the Army strategy that will be released in detail on Thursday in conjunction with the Defence Update 2005.

As part of the initial project phase, a range of vehicles will be purchased for Army's high readiness units, such as 3 Brigade, 5 Aviation Regiment, 10 Force Support Battalion located in Townsville and Sydney a well as RAAF units at Amberley.

Field vehicles and trailers are the backbone of the ADF's land war fighting support, sustainment and deployment capability. The roles of this fleet are to transport personnel, combat supplies and, when necessary, evacuate casualties.

These vehicles and trailers also serve as platforms and prime movers for weapons systems as well as command, control, communications, computers, intelligence, reconnaissance, surveillance and electronic warfare capabilities.

The tender for the medium and heavy vehicles and modules has been released to a shortlist of nine companies announced in March and an open tender has been released for the light range of vehicles and modules. Favourable consideration will be given to those companies who will assemble the vehicles in Australia.

The request for tender for the trailer segment will be restricted to Australian-based manufacturers, plus those vehicle suppliers capable of supplying a proprietary trailer. The request for tender is tailored to encourage the production of trailers in Australia.

Our current fleet is ageing and is becoming more costly to maintain and upgrade. The vehicles will range from lightweight four-wheel drives to heavy trucks and prime movers with interchangeable modules to increase operational flexibility.

This will be a significant opportunity for Australian industry to generate and sustain critical industry skills and infrastructure.

Project Overlander is fulfilling a key commitment in the Government's 2000 Defence White Paper and will ensure our soldiers are properly protected and well equipped to do their job," Senator Hill said.

The RFT for all three fleet segments will close in May 2006 with detailed proposals presented to Government in 2007. The target date for delivery of the first of the vehicles is December 2009.

Each RFT will also require offers to be

made on support of the fleet, and will seek an agreement to guarantee the whole of life acquisition and logistic support of the new fleet, potentially for the next 30 years.

<u>Afghan Veterans Welcomed Home</u> <u>- Soldiers' Gallantry Honoured</u>

The Governor-General and the Prime Minister have officially welcomed home members of the Afghanistan Special Forces Task Group in a ceremony at Perth's Campbell Barracks recently.

His Excellency Major General Michael Jefferey and Mr Howard joined the Chief of the Defence Force Air Chief Marshal Angus Houston and Chief of Army Lieutenant General Peter Leahy in welcoming Western Australia-based members of the Afghanistan Special Forces Task Group (SFTG).

The Western Australia-based soldiers, predominantly from the Special Air Service Regiment (SASR), formed part of the 190-strong Special Forces Task Group (SFTG) operating in Southern Afghanistan since late last year to promote security and stability.

During the ceremony the Governor-General and Prime Minister praised the professionalism and courage of the SFTG members who operated in an extremely demanding environment against a resourceful, capable and tenacious adversary.

Their mission was to assist Coalition forces destroy Taliban and Al Qaeda resistance to Afghanistan's democratically elected government. The SFTG has been engaged in dangerous work that is vital to Afghanistan's stability and a major contribution to fighting terrorism.

The dangers faced by the SFTG were highlighted by the presentation of two gallantry awards to SFTG members by the Governor General. A Sergeant and a Warrant Officer Class Two were both awarded the Medal for Gallantry for

their outstanding actions, leadership and bravery during a long and difficult engagements with anti-coalition militia elements early in the SFTG's tour.

The Medal for Gallantry is the third highest award for gallantry in the Australian Honours and Awards system.

The SFTG is comprised of soldiers from SASR, 4th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment (Commando), Incident Response Regiment, 1 Commando Regiment and the Special Operations Combat Services Support Company. Specialist staff from the wider Australian Defence Force filled other roles within the Task Group. The SFTG conducted a rotation earlier this year and its operations in Afghanistan will conclude in September 2006.

Chief of the Army Lieutenant-General Peter Leahy, AO and Special Operations Commander - Australia Major-General Mike Hindmarsh welcomed home East-coast-based members of the Afghanistan Special Forces Task Group in a ceremony at Holsworthy Barracks today.

The soldiers, predominantly from the Fourth Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (Commando), formed part of the 190-personnel strong Special Forces Task Group (SFTG) operating in Southern Afghanistan since late last year.

During the ceremony Lieutenant-General Leahy praised the professionalism and courage of the SFTG members who operated in an extremely demanding environment against a resourceful, capable and tenacious adversary.

"On several operations, force packages of Special Air Services Regiment, 4 Royal Australian Regiment (Commando) and Incident Response Regiment elements worked closely together to achieve maximum tactical and psychological effect against the anti-coalition militia," Lieutenant-General Leahy

said.

"The task group approach was highly successful and is a hallmark for future operations not just for Special Operations Command, but the whole Army."

SERGEANT "Y"

TO BE AWARDED THE MEDAL FOR GALLANTRY

For Gallantry, as a Patrol Commander, while under intense Anti-Coalition Militia (ACM) fire and showing total disregard for his own safety he manoeuvred forward to recover a machine gun in order to protect the left flank and to neutralise enemy fire positions.

During the conduct of an Operation in southern Afghanistan, an Australian force was engaged by a numerically superior ACM element. In the lead up to the engagement Sergeant "Y" was tasked, by the on-scene commander, to conduct a foot patrol to clear and secure a potentially dangerous obstacle in order to facilitate the safe passage of the Australian patrol. Whilst conducting this task Sergeant "Y" commenced to clear and secure the south-western sector of a village and obstacle choke point.

An engagement on the south-eastern sector of the village and subsequent contact resulted in the south-western clearing patrol being separated from the remainder of call-sign. Sergeant "Y" placed himself in an extremely hazardous situation whilst under heavy fire to gain situational awareness and command of his patrol in order to linkup with the main-force element. On linking up with the main-force element Sergeant "Y", whilst under fire, retrieved a machine gun from a tactical vehicle in order to move to a position to put effective fire onto ACM positions. This action turned the balance on the left flank. enabling the entire Australian element to regain the initiative. Sergeant "Y", with assistance from another patrol mem-
