## "Sadly Forgotten" by COL Terry Beaton

On ANZAC Day 2006 at the War Graves Cemetery at Kanchanaburi, Thailand – the dreadful loss of eightv four (84) AEME POWs who had died from disease, starvation and brutality either during or after construction of the infamous Burma Railway, was finally remembered for the first time in 61 years with the laying of a wreath on behalf of the Corps. The most poignant line of the "Ode of Remembrance", which too many take for granted, unless you yourself have lost mates following warlike combat, is "Lest We *Forget*". Unfortunately the inhumane destruction of these 84 men's lives, had been forgotten by the Corps, until now, and does not even rate a mention in our comprehensive Corps History written by Theo Barker.

When I graduated into the Corps in 1974, the focus of training was still directed to Counter Revolutionary Warfare (CRW) following our involvement in Vietnam. Though at Corps Training Wing at RTC during my YO's (Young Officers) Course, we still learnt from Army pamphlets written after WW2

preaching Continental Defence and the doctrine of RAEME in the "Paddock". with clear and distinct lines of repair and recovery stretching back from the FEBA. Yet at no time did we ever deal with our own Corps History beyond the superficial look at how the Corps evolved from the sands of the Middle East. It was not until 1992 with the publication of our first official Corps History that I finally learnt about the decimation of the Corps between WW2 and Korean Wars. I certainly did not appreciate that casualty numbers actually represented individual lives until my involvement with the Burma Railway, Moreover, it helped me to realise that the "true" victims of war are not actually the dead, as they have walked to the white light and have no more worries, but instead it is the survivors and their families who have to live with the effects of war for the rest of their lives. This was brought home by the wife of an ex-POW who said "Terry, have you ever heard a man scream in his sleep and wake in a sweat soaked bed". A story that I have heard repeatedly from wives of Vietnam Vets and peacekeepers.

In hindsight, I now realise that our Corps is like a Victorian policemen – essential, yet nobody really wants them until their house is robbed or their life is threatened! Likewise operational planners in Canberra rarely think about maintaining the essential equipment required to conduct operations. If they did. RAEME numbers in contingents would be more realistic to support the equipment deployed. Similarly when the accolades are being handed out at the end of a warlike activity, it is always the Arms Corps that get the public recognition with little acknowledgement going to the Logistic Forces which support their sustained operations. Similarly the same applies to recognition of the dead. For years I have watched Battalion Association after Battalion

the supermarket - palsied now and aggravatingly slow - who helped liberate a Nazi death camp and who wishes all day long that his wife were still alive to hold him when the nightmares come.

He is an ordinary and yet an extraordinary human being, a person who offered some of his life's most vital years in the service of his country, and who sacrificed his ambitions so others would not have to sacrifice theirs. He is a soldier and a saviour and a sword against the darkness, and he is nothing more than the finest, greatest testimony on behalf of the finest, greatest nation ever known. So remember, each time you see someone who has served our countrv. just lean over and say Thank You. That's all most people need, and in most cases it will mean more than any medals they could have been awarded or were awarded.

When this temporarily single mom was done explaining her situation, all of the soldiers huddled together for a brief second. Then one of the other servicemen pulled out a military looking walkietalkie. They started playing with the device and talking back and forth on it.

After about 10-15 seconds of this, the young soldier walked back over to Courtney, bent down and said this to her, "I spoke to your daddy and he told me to give this to you." #### What Is a Veteran?

Some veterans bear visible signs of their service: a missing limb, a jagged scar, a certain look in the eye. Others may carry the evidence inside them: a pin holding a bone together, a piece of shrapnel in the leg - or perhaps another sort of inner steel: the soul's ally forged in the refinery of adversity. Except in parades, however, the men and women who have kept America safe wear no badge or emblem. You can't tell a vet just by looking.

#### What is a vet?

He is the cop on the beat who spent six months in Saudi Arabia sweating two gallons a day making sure the armoured personnel carriers didn't run out of fuel.

He is the bar-room loudmouth, dumber than five wooden planks, whose overgrown frat-boy behaviour is outweighed a hundred times in the cosmic scales by four hours of exquisite bravery near the 38th parallel.

She - or he - is the nurse who fought against futility and went to sleep sob-

bing every night for two solid years in Da Nang.

He is the POW who went away one person and came back another - or didn't come back AT ALL.

He is the Quantico drill instructor that has never seen combat - but has saved countless lives by turning slouchy, noaccount rednecks and gang members into Marines, and teaching them to watch each other's backs.

He is the parade-riding Legionnaire who pins on his ribbons and medals with a prosthetic hand.

He is the career quartermaster who watches the ribbons and medals pass him by.

He is the three anonymous heroes in The Tomb Of The Unknowns, whose presence at the Arlington National Cemetery must forever preserve the memory of all the anonymous heroes whose valour dies unrecognised with them on the battlefield or in the ocean's sunless deep.

He is the old guy bagging groceries at

Association march on ANZAC Day and numerous Battalion Associations lay wreaths at Kanchanaburi, but until the Inaugural "RAEME Day of Remembrance" this year, I had never seen a wreath laid or small memorial crosses erected by a Logistic Corps to specifically remember those members who had lost their lives.

To put things into perspective, according to Theo's History only six (6) RAEME personnel died during our entire nine year involvement in Vietnam following LT K.J. Beatty visit (9-17 Aug 63) from AAF (FARELF) in Malaysia. Yet in only a three year period spanning 15 Feb 42- 16 Aug 45, eighty four (84) AEME POWs died either in Thailand, Burma or Japan slaving for the enemy. This figure does not take into account those that died as POWs under the Japanese in Borneo and Ambon with the capture of 75, 88 and 104 LADs attached to "Sparrow Force". Sadly, few if any POWs on "the line" even knew that they were members of the new Australian Corps of Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (AEME) as they were captured with the "Fall of Singapore" on 15 Feb 42, before any official Corps re-badging had taken place. As such, only AEME personnel posted to Ordnance Wskps and LADs have been subsequently re-buried in War Grave Cemeteries under our Corps' identification. Armament and specialist tradesman on Battalion and Artillery Regiment establishments may still have been re-buried under their parent unit's Corps identification, thereby reducing the actual number of our Corps who died as POWs. When comparing the total number of Corps deaths with the ratio of AEME personnel in Ordnance Wksps and LADs to the WW2 establishment of 1200 for an Infantry Battalion, it doesn't take a genius to realise that our Corps's prorata death rate of POWs was equivalent if not higher than

that for the Infantry. Yet until this year, sadly these men had been forgotten by their own Corps.

Appropriately another member of our ANZAC pilgrimage group this year was a 84 year old WW2 AEME Veteran, named Doug Brazier. CFN later Acting SGT (Instructor) Brazier had served in the Islands with 113th Aust Bde Wksp. which was a Victorian raised unit with the majority coming from the Geelong area. During an informal service beside an original open grave in the "Cholera Hill" Cemetery at Shimo Sonkurai, where 152 Aussie had died during a cholera epidemic in Jul 43. Doug broke down as he realised only three of the 120 from his own WW2 unit were still alive. Although very honoured to have laid the first wreath on behalf of the Corps in Kanchanaburi and subsequently at the Thanbyuzayat War Graves Cemetery in Burma on 1 May 06 - where the majority of AEME POWs are buried - my greatest memory however, is having Doug stand alongside me as we jointly laid poppies on some of the numerous AEME graves in both cemeteries. Sadly however, for 14 of our dead there is no known grave as the single greatest known cause of death was "drowning at sea" when the Rakuyo Maru was sunk by US submarine Sealion on 12 Sep 44 in the South China Sea on it's way to the coal mines of Japan. Having just survived the rigors of the Burma railway these men lost their lives from so-called "Friendly fire".

#### "Lest We Forget"

#### Eligibility And Retrospectivity Of The Army Combat Badge

On 15 June 2006, the CASAC was asked to make a decision on the retrospectivity of the Army Combat Badge (ACB). The CA reserved his decision until he.was satisfied with

certain ammendments to the elgibility criteria. The CA has since determined that the default setting for teh ACB should remain witrh those units whose primary focus is combat operations. Therefore, the eligibility for the award of the ACB will be as follows:

Any member of any Corps who were force assigned to an infantry, armour, artillery, aviation or combat emngineer based combat team/battle group or similar unit/sub unit and has given either continuous or an aggregate of 90 days satisfactory service on warlike operations for a single deplyment or operation is eligible for the award of the ACB. The CA may alter the eligibility criteria depending on the ioperation or deployment.

The CA has also decided that the ACB will be retrospective to 1950, in alignment with the award of the Infantry Combat Badge (ICB). Given that the ACB is a dress embellishmemt and not an award, the responsibility for approval and distribution remains with the Army.

#### **DFRDB Tax 1 July 2007**

The question was raised to Blue Ryan re DFRDB and tax concessions under the new legislation re Super Funds at TPI meeting on 13 June 2006.

Blue was unsure of the situation and suggested a fact sheet be produced. I have had previous emails re this matter and provided this information for info of other members and possibly a fact sheet.

I rang Treasury today (14 June) to clarify point some points.

Further to my question on how DFRDB

will be treated as a result of the Budget.

I rang the Treasury information line on 1800 012 238.

They have informed me that DFRDB like most if not all Government Super schemes were non taxed and will not be tax free under the new legislation.

However people under such super schemes will receive a 10 percent rebate once age of 60 years is reached.

This means if a person is on say a \$15,000.00 pa pension they will get a 10 percent rebate of \$1500.00. le. If the person had a tax bill on say \$500.00 on their taxable income they would receive a tax refund of \$1000.00.

The 10 percent being a rebate not a deduction.

If there was no tax to be paid the person would receive the full \$1500.00 Rebate as a cheque.

Other factors and notes.

You must be over 60 to get the rebate of 10%. If under 60 normal tax applies (no change). The above is subject to change between now and implementation 1 July 2007. Basically if over 60 you will get a 10% rebate which should effectively cut out any tax on Comsuper anyway.

b. The proposed taxation treatment for lump sum benefit payments is:

a. For those aged 60 or over 97 a rate of 15 per cent would apply to the total of all payments up to an upper threshold (\$700,000 97 approximately the lump sum RBL) and the top marginal tax rate above that amount.

b. For those aged 55 to 59 97 a rate of 15 per cent would apply for payments up to a lower threshold (the low-rate ETP threshold, currently at \$129,751), 30 per cent above this amount up to the upper threshold (\$700,000) and the top marginal tax rate above that amount.

c. For those aged under 55, a rate of 30 per cent would apply up to the upper threshold (\$700,000) and the top marginal tax rate above this amount.

c. Pension payments arising from an untaxed superannuation source to an individual over the age of 60 would be taxed at marginal tax rates with a 10 per cent offset. Payments to those below age 60 would be taxed at marginal tax rates without an offset (as is the case currently).

#### <u>Defence Ahead Of Schedule On</u> <u>Military Justice Reform</u>

Defence's reforms to its military justice system are ahead of schedule,

with the implementation of 16 recommendations contained in the Government's response to the report on the effectiveness of Australia's military justice system.

The Senate Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade Legislation committee yesterday delivered a generally favourable judgement on Defence's reforms to its military justice system in its first sixmonthly report.

These reforms will deliver impartial, rigorous and fair outcomes through enhanced oversight, greater transparency and improved timeliness.

At the time of the report, a total of seven full recommendations, and significant elements of a further two recommendations contained in the Government's response to the report on Australia's military justice system had been completed on, or ahead of, the Implementation Plan schedule.

Since then, further recommendations have been completed bringing the total to 16.

Chief of the Defence Force Air Chief Marshal Angus Houston welcomed the positive comments of the Parliamentary Committee, in particular its conclusion that "at this early stage of the implementation program, the ADF has demonstrated a clear commitment to improving Australia's military justice system."

Air Chief Marshal Houston said the report demonstrated the genuine commitment to change within the culture of the Australian Defence Force with regard to military justice.

"We are determined to improve the military justice system and the progress made in the first six months shows we are heading in the right direction," he said.

"The Senate report identified shortfalls

in the performance of service police investigations. Dedicated service police investigators are now deployed to Iraq, Afghanistan, the Solomon Islands and East Timor. These deployments further assure that the Australian Defence Force Military Justice System delivers impartial, rigorous and fair outcomes, both at home and on deployed operations.

"The audit of ADF service police investigative capability has been completed. The recommendations will inform the best means for developing the capability and implementing the new tri-Service investigative unit.

"The backlog of Redress of Grievance cases has been cleared and there is no longer a backlog that previously caused undue pressure on the complaint resolution system. The Defence Fairness and Resolution branch has been established as the central management body for dealing with all complaints and grievances."

#### Additional Troops For Afghanistan Deployment

The Australian Government will further strengthen the capability of the Reconstruction Task Force (RTF) that will soon deploy to Afghanistan. Additional infantry, engineers, communications staff and other specialists will be deployed.

Approximately 150 personnel will be added to the 240 strong RTF announced by the Prime Minister on the 8th of May. The Government has decided to increase the size of the RTF by around 30 personnel. The deployment will also include an infantry company group of approximately 120 people to provide force protection during the first six months of the deployment.

The additional deployments will bring the total RTF strength to around 400

# Advice On The Rehabilitation Of A Soldier On Return From South Vietnam

- 1. This is to certify that your son/ husband/ father/ uncle/ lover/ cousin/ nephew/ mate/ fiancé/ old friend/ brother.....having completed an arduous tour of duty in the Republic of VIETNAM will be returning to o AUSTRALIA.
- 2. You should appreciate that he is no longer as sweet and unspoiled as he was when he left Australia fired with patriotic fervour and zest for adventure. He is now older, probably wiser, leaner and possibly short-tempered.
- 3. One of the earlier indications of his changed character will be periodic hot and cold flusher accompanied

personnel.

Advance elements of the RTF will start to deploy into Afghanistan during August to commence preparation of base facilities and logistic support infrastructure. These elements will be followed by the majority of the RTF deploying in September with the final elements expected to deploy in November.

The decision to increase the RTF follows a detailed review of the situation in Afghanistan and planning and consultation with the Netherlands Government and NATO. This planning has determined that additional troops are required to provide the necessary level of security and protection to the RTF mission to make an effective contribution to reconstruction and security in Oruzgan Province.

All ADF personnel deployed in Afghanistan remain under Australian national command.

The deployment of RTF further demonstrates the Australian Government's commitment to Afghanistan's reconstruction and stabilisation. The RTF will be a key part of the Netherlands led Provincial Reconstruction Team (PRT) in Oruzgan province under the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force.

All Australians should feel proud of the members of the ADF who are serving their country. This is a difficult time for their families and our thoughts and prayers are with them.

The RTF will work on reconstruction and community based projects. It will be capable of doing construction work, providing project management skills, and conducting trade training for the local population. These activities will ensure that the benefits of the deployment continue long after our personnel have returned home. The RTF will also have a security and protection element

to focus on local security at RTF work sites.

The ADF constantly reviews the environment for all deployments and adjusts personnel numbers, tactics and procedures when required. This change to the RTF structure is a product of that review process and ensures that we will have the right people with the right equipment in order to safely provide the best possible outcome.

Afghanistan needs support to achieve stability and it's in Australia's interest to help Afghanistan achieve that. Terrorism is more likely to emerge from dysfunctional dictatorships, therefore Australia has a direct stake in ensuring Afghanistan's transition to democracy is successful. We must stick with our allies and stand up for our values. A failure to do so will inevitably mean leaving the next generation hostage to global forces they will never control.

#### **Australia Gets World's Best Tanks**

The Abrams tanks represent a significant step in providing Australia with a stronger Defence Force, with which to protect our people, interests and values.

Today, the Australian Government has taken delivery of the first 18 of 59 Abrams Tanks. This project is an investment of more than \$500 million in Australia's security.

The Abrams project is ahead of schedule, and within budget. These tanks are the most advanced and capable tank in the world.

This capability will be increasingly important, as widespread proliferation of cheap, high tech and lethal anti-armour, anti-personnel weapons could pose an increasing threat in any future conflicts.

The Abrams Tank will provide our Army with the mobility, firepower and sophis-

ticated networking capability with which to defeat the enemy, along with superior protection that will enhance safety for our soldiers. These tanks will be harder to hit. When the Abrams hit, they will hit harder.

Abrams tanks are a key component of the Hardened and Networked Army initiative announced last year. They will also enable us to co-ordinate and network with allies.

We will have a number of options for transporting these tanks, including: our new C-17 heavy airlift aircraft; Amphibious Ships; the Adelaide to Darwin rail network; and our new tank transporter trucks.

In total, Australia will take delivery of 59 Abrams tanks, seven M88A2 Hercules Armoured Recovery Vehicles, 14 Heavy Tank Transporters, eight Refueling Trucks, six Advanced Gunnery Training Simulators and one Tank Driver Trainer Simulator.

This significant investment further illustrates the importance of the Government's long standing commitment to Defence and ability to deliver a strong economy. Since 1996, funding for Defence has increased by more than 40% in real terms and the 2006/07 Budget committed to an average 3% real increase each year for the next decade.

The Abrams will be transported to the School of Armour at Puckapunyal, with the remainder of the 59 tanks eventually being based in Darwin.

Australian industry is playing a key role in delivering this capability. The prime contractor for the Heavy Tank Transporter is MAN Military Vehicle Systems Australia Pty Ltd. Drake Trailers Pty Ltd, an Australian-owned and operated Brisbane-based company, is manufacturing 14 swing-wing trailers. Brisbane-based MAN Automotralers. Brisbane-based MAN Automotralers.

#### **More Sad News**

Donald Clarence Dalton another post WW2 soldier and icon of the Australian Army finally slipped from this life in Frankston Private Hospital at about 0200hrs recently after a horrific battle

Over the years, war veterans have had to fight for their benefits but it has been over the last five years or so that there has been an obvious increase in the numbers of disenchanted veterans. My personal belief is that these veterans have legitimate grievances. This could easily be remedied should the government of the day and responsible exservice organizations' accept their obligations of looking after war veterans. Below, I have tried to give an indication of some of these grievances which may give the reader an idea of just what veterans have to cope with.

#### **TPI Special Rate - Erosion**

The government has consistently ignored the plight of TPIs even after presentation of all the arguments, the Clarke Report and responsible ESOs' such as the TPI Federation. Indeed, the National President of the TPI Federation - Blue Ryan has been ignored by our Prime Minister - John Howard and has consistently refused Blue an audience. Howard appears to only listen to the National President of the R&SL - Bill Crews who himself has seen to be lacking in his responsibilities to veterans.

There has been an abundance of evidence presented to government over this issue but I suggest that it can be simplified by comparing TPIs manner of indexation to that of War Widows and those on the dole. The government did make some change a couple of years back by indexing the amount above the General Rate (100%) to CPI or MTAWE whichever is higher but ignored many veterans who receive part of General Rate. This in effect still has the TPI Special rate eroding.

War Widows and those on the dole have their pension and welfare payments indexed to CPI or MTAWE whichever is the higher. Evidence has been presented that shows the gap is closing on those in receipt of the Special Rate and those in receipt of War Widows pension or the dole. To put it even

simpler, if one was to compare the figures over the next number of years, it would see a War Widow/ dole recipient getting more money than a Special Rate recipient. Commonsense tells me that this would be a ludicrous situation so why won't the Howard government fix the problem?

Contrary to what you may hear, the amount of expenditure required to remedy the situation is little when compared to the size of the budget expenditure for veterans affairs (last budget \$10 billion).

#### **Funeral Benefits**

We now have two different levels of Funeral benefits, one for those that come under the VEA i.e. \$1000 and one for those that come under MCRS \$4000. Could someone please explain to the disgruntled veterans out there just how this sort of logic can come out of our politicians? How is it possible to have two classes of war veterans, surely funeral costs are constant and undertakers would not see any difference.

#### **Gold Card**

Once again John Howard and the Liberal party decided that it would give a Gold Card to all those over aged 70 years with qualifying service. This occurred as a promise at the last election by the government of the day.

Could one be cynical in suggesting that this was an election vote grab? However, ramifications from such a generous offer have had repercussions from many in the medical fraternity which have now withdrawn their services for the acceptance of the Gold Card. This has had an adverse effect on those war veterans that really require treatment and access to doctors' and specialists' in their locations.

What it also has done is increase the amount spent on health care from the DVA budget. The government claims that the increases in the amount on the DVA budget means that veterans are getting the care they deserve. What

"Soldiers will operate the protected weapon station by remote control from inside the Bushmaster, without exposing themselves to fire.

# Single ADF Members To Pay Less For Living-In Accommodation

The Minister Assisting the Minister for Defence Bruce Billson announced to-day that single ADF members will pay less for Living-in Accommodation (LIA).

Defence had completed work on a new method for calculating the LIA contribution paid by many single ADF members.

"I am pleased to announce that the new method will result in members paying less for their LIA this financial year.

"The new contribution rates for LIA took effect from 27 July 2006. Members will see a corresponding increase in their disposable income from 10 August 2006." Mr Billson said.

This new method is based on the assessed average market rent for LIA using valuations produced by the Aus-

tralian Valuation Office.

Members will pay a rate for their accommodation that is a proportion of the national average rental cost of similar accommodation in the private sector. Using a national average protects ADF members from regional differences in rental markets as they move on posting.

The new method applies the same principle already used to calculate contributions paid by members with dependants who live in service residences.

A long-standing Defence policy is that members with dependants should pay 50% of the Defence Rent Bill for Service Residences. We are now applying this principle to members without dependants, who will pay 50% of the nationally-assessed average market rent if they occupy Level 3, 4 or 5 accommodation.

Members who occupy Level 1 or 2 LIA will only pay 40% of the assessed averaged market rent. This recognises the age and lower quality of this accommodation, which is usually occupied by the most junior ranks of the Defence Force.

# **Heavy Tank Transporters Delivered Ahead Of Time**

The Defence Materiel Organisation (DMO) is pleased to announce the delivery of the first three heavy tank transporters to the Australian Army today. This equipment is an important part of the new tank capability being delivered by the DMO.

Brigadier Grant Cavenagh, Director General Land Manoeuvre Systems, took delivery of the vehicles at RAAF Base Amberley, Queensland, at the conclusion of conversion training for Army drivers. Technical acceptance of the vehicles occurred in late July 2006 some 65 days ahead of schedule.

The new equipment will allow the M1A1 Abrams Integrated Management (AIM) main battle tanks and M88A2 HER-CULES armoured recovery vehicles to be transported on Australian roads.

These heavy tank transporters will meet the first Abrams tanks for the Australian Army due to arrive from the United States in September 2006. The transis just another example of the nanny state and one that I am very concerned could ruin the future of piping in Scotland." he said.

# Soldier Remains In Stable Condition

The Australian soldier hospitalised after a recent rocket attack on the International Zone in Baghdad is expected to be transferred to a United States military hospital in Germany before being brought back to Australia.

Townsville based Corporal Sarah Webster remains in a stable condition in a Coalition hospital in Baghdad after receiving head and lower limb injuries in the attack

Three other injured soldiers were released from hospital following treatment for minor wounds including concussion, bruising and minor lacerations; which are typical in this kind of attack.

The Lance Corporal and Signallers from Townsville and the Craftsman from Brisbane are now back with their mates in SECDET and are in good spirits. The condition of these soldiers will continue to be monitored.

Brigadier Mick Moon, commander of the Australian forces in the Middle East, has conducted a review of the SECDET's force protection measures and is satisfied that they provide the best possible protection for Australian troops.

Brigadier Moon praised his troops for their rapid and professional response to yesterday's incident. SECDET personnel reacted quickly to the situation and evacuated the casualties within minutes ensuring that they received expert medical attention immediately.

Rocket attacks are common occurrences in Baghdad. The accommodation and working areas of all Australian personnel serving in Baghdad have ballistic and fragmentation protective measures.

These measures were effective in preventing further and more serious casualties. SECDET will continue in its vital role of supporting the Australian Embassy staff in Baghdad.

The families of the soldiers have requested that the media respect their privacy.

# Soldier Feedback Makes Army Bushmaster Vehicles Even Better

The protection and crew comfort of one of the most effective new items of equipment of the Australian Army, the Bushmaster infantry mobility vehicle, is being further improved as a result of operational experience in the Middle East.

The Vice Chief of the Defence Force, Lieutenant General Ken Gillespie, expressed confidence in the Bushmaster following press reports on 1 September that crews had criticised the lack of an on-board drinking water cooling system, and aspects of armour protection.

"Feedback from crews of the 26 Bushmasters on operations in the Middle East is significantly influencing improvements under way for this vehicle," Lieutenant General Gillespie said.

"The results of listening to this feedback include a new prototype cooling system for the on-board drinking water tank, which is planned for field testing in October this year."

Lieutenant General Gillespie said that Bushmaster vehicles already provide crews with a high level of blast and ballistic protection, but Defence is enhancing crew protection features.

"In July 2006 the Government approved rapid acquisition of a protected weapon station for Bushmaster," he aspects of the Post-armistice Korean Service Review Report.

Some Australian ex-service personnel have strongly lobbied to have the Australian Service Medal 1945 – 75 upgraded to the Australian Active Service Medal (AASM) 1945-75 and accompanied by the issue of the Returned from Active Service Badge (RASB).

While acknowledging these efforts, Mr Billson said that after further consultation and careful consideration, the Government has accepted the view of Defence that the service of those in post-armistice Korea was not considered "warlike" for the purposes of awarding the AASM 1945-75 or RASB.

He reiterated that the end of the combatant phase of the Korean War was defined by the signing of the Armistice on 27 July 1953.

"The Armistice was clear and unambiguous in putting in place a complete cessation of hostilities and of all acts of armed force in Korea," Mr Billson said.

"Although the Working Party's findings recommended the establishment and awarding of a General Service Medal (GSM) and RASB, only one Australian military service medal is awarded to recognise a single type of service in such circumstances. The ASM 1945-75 with Clasp 'KOREA' has been duly awarded for this service." he said.

"In line with this policy, the award of the RASB is inconsistent with the awarding of the ASM, as the RASB is only awarded for "warlike" service."

Mr Billson said the medal system's "rule-making" is already subject to intense scrutiny up to the highest levels of government.

"In particular, I have great faith in the existing Interdepartmental Committee

(IDC) and its ability to appropriately advise the Government on matters relating to Defence Honours and Awards," he said.

The Post-armistice Korean Service Review identified the names of 18 Australians who died after the cessation of hostilities.

Mr Billson is examining possible options for commemorating those who died while serving our country in post-armistice Korea, in an appropriate way.

## UK Army's Bagpipe Students Told To Pipe Down

British army bagpipers are being told to limit their playing to as little as 15 minutes a day because of noise concerns.

Under new health and safety guidelines, the 100 soldiers learning to play the bagpipes at the Army Piping School in Edinburgh will be allowed to play for 24 minutes a day outside or 15 minutes a day indoors.

Alternatively, they will have to wear earplugs while they practise, according to the Ministry of Defence.

The new rules have been recommended after a study by the Army Medical Directorate, which found the noise could reach 111 decibels, equal to that of a pneumatic drill. Indoors it could reach 116 decibels, as loud as a chainsaw.

"We have a duty of care to protect the hearing of all our soldiers," an army spokesman said. "We are carrying out that duty of care in implementing this recommendation."

Bagpipes have long played a major role in Scottish regiments, members of which have traditionally been piped into battle.

Davy Garrett, who played the pipes in the army for 12 years and now runs a piping school in the Highlands, said the new regulations could threaten the future of bagpipe use in Scotland. "This - porters will go into service immediately delivering tanks and recovery vehicles to training establishments and operational units.

Australian industry is providing a significant part of this capability. The prime contractor for the project is MAN Military Vehicle Systems Australia Pty Ltd.

#### Order Of The Day - A Larger Army

- 1. Recently the Prime Minister announced a further increase to the size of the Australian Army. This increase is in addition to that announced, in December 2005, as part of the hardened and networked army. In total these two increases will see an army of approximately 29,000.
- 2. Government has authorised this increase in the size of the army for two reasons. First, in clear recognition of the operational tempo of the army right now in Iraq, Afghanistan, East Timor, Solomon Islands and the wide range of smaller United Nations and other deployments. Second, in anticipation of increasing strategic volatility and further demands being placed on the army both in our region and further afield.
- 3. The hardened and networked army plan already recognises changes to both the global security environment and the nature of our future battlefield. The HNA plan will continue with its emphasis on combined arms battle groups and the maximisation of army's firepower, protection, mobility and communications. The fundamental task of army will remain as close combat in combined arms groups.
- 4. However, as we have seen in recent campaigns as an army we are increasingly required to be among populations at risk, supporting, protecting and persuading them. This is likely to continue into the future. Defence and security challenges of this nature are very demanding and will take place in complex environments. They will require

more boots on the ground.

- 5. Over the next few weeks the details of the plan to further increase the size of the army will be explained. Right now I would like to provide an outline of the major aspects of the plan. We will:
- A. Split 5/7 RAR and make two mechanised battalions under command of HQ 1 brigade and place one of these battalions in Adelaide;
- B. Re-role 3 RAR as a light infantry battalion and place it under command of HQ 3 bde and in due course locate it in Townsville;
- C. Re-raise 8/9 RAR under command of HQ 7 brigade in South East Queensland:
- D. Raise and supplement appropriate elements of combat support and combat service support in existing brigade locations; and
- E. Extend the defence Capability plan to acquire the necessary extra equipment to equip the New units.
- 6. This will mean an army of 8 infantry battalions. This will increase our capacity to provide combined arms battle groups and allow us to meet government's overarching requirement of deploying and sustaining a brigade on operations as well as separate contingency forces.
- 7. This task of increasing the size of the army will present us with many challenges. The most significant challenge will be recruitment and retention. As an army we are currently under strength and must at first overcome this deficit before embarking on the plan to make a larger army. We can achieve the task. The announcement by the Prime Minister provides substantial funds to implement an extensive range of personnel initiatives to help recruit and retain the soldiers required. These initiatives include:
- A. Enlistment, re-enlistment and lateral transfer bonuses;

#### <u>Tenix Joins Australian</u> <u>Government's Sadi Program</u>

The Department of Defence is releasing this statement on behalf of Mrs Naomi Nary in response to the public release of outcomes from the Board of Inquiry into her husband's death, Warrant Officer Class Two David Nary formerly of the Special Air Services Regiment.

Mrs Nary has requested her privacy be respected and that she will not be conducting any media interviews at this time.

"I am pleased that the announcement of the Board of Inquiry findings closes what has been an extremely difficult period since Dave was tragically taken from us last year. While these findings do not bring back my husband or the father of my children they do reinforce what I have known all along. Dave was an excellent soldier, working with equally exceptional people. At the time of the accident he was doing a difficult job in demanding circumstances. Dave did nothing wrong and neither did those with him. It was just an extremely unfortunate accident that has taken a wonderful husband and father from us.

"The Board of Inquiry was a long and emotionally demanding process but I am thankful that the ADF conducted it in such a professional and considerate manner. The decision to keep the inquiry closed, while important for the security of Dave's unit and mates, allowed my family to learn the facts and limit the outside speculation. I am sure this outside scrutiny is causing further grief for those families currently awaiting the outcomes of other ADF Boards.

"I must also express my thanks to the members of Dave's unit, the Special Air Service Regiment. From the moment of the accident they have worked to en-

sure that I, and my children, have the support we required, that we were kept informed of what was occurring and most importantly that Dave's reputation and honour were maintained.

"We are immensely proud of the job he did and the person that he was and we will always love and miss Dave. Our lives will never be the same without him "
