Bougainville, East Timor Personnel Needed For Study

Thousands of veterans of the Near North have been urged to take part in a major ongoing study of the physical and mental health effects of overseas deployments.

Under the Department of Defence's Deployment Health Surveillance Program, the Centre for Military and Veterans' Health at the University of Queensland is conducting the study of more than 12,000 service personnel who have deployed to East Timor and Bougainville.

The centre will invite veterans to participate in an examination of the physical, emotional and social effects of service in East Timor from Operation FABER in mid 1999 through SPITFIRE, WARDEN, TANAGER, CITADEL and Operation SPIRE up until May 2005.

Personnel deployed on peace monitoring duties to Bougainville between 1997 and 2003 as part of Operations BEL ISI I and II will also be invited to participate in the study along with a comparison group of personnel who did not deploy, but were otherwise

eligible.

The Chief of the Defence Force, Air Chief Marshal Angus Houston, and Repatriation Commissioner Brigadier Bill Rolfe (Retd) have encouraged veterans to join the study.

The ADF would be able to better protect the health of ADF members undertaking and preparing for future deployments with the knowledge gathered by the study, they said.

Participants in the voluntary study will complete a survey about their health and service history which, on consent only, will be linked to Defence health and psychological records.

Veterans of the Solomon Islands were invited to participate in a separate study last year.

FOR BACKGROUND: The CMVH is a consortium of the University of Queensland, University of Adelaide and Charles Darwin University, which is dedicated to innovatively seeking solutions to military and veterans' health issues through research, education, e-Health and public debate.

The Centre has been commissioned by Defence to carry out the study.

M113 Upgrade Project Back On Track

It was recently announced that the M113 upgrade project was now back on track and estimated to meet its original schedule and specifications within budget.

The Land 106 project will deliver 350 upgraded M113 Armoured Personnel Carrier vehicles with improvements in their protection, firepower, mobility and

supportability.

The M113 project experienced some well-known technical problems in the development phase, and it was feared these problems would impact on the cost and schedule of the project.

The serious technical risks faced by the project have now been resolved, the schedule pressures have been reduced, and the project does not face cost pressures.

The upgraded Armoured Personnel Carriers have successfully concluded a long and rigorous testing program and our troops are receiving a reliable vehicle that delivers increased firepower, protection and mobility.

Sixteen vehicles have now been delivered to the Army's 7RAR (mechanised infantry). Another nine vehicles (six initial production vehicles and three pre-production vehicles) are being operated in training at Puckapunyal and Bandiana. A further ten vehicles will be issued for training shortly.

Production at Tenix's Bandiana facilities is now being ramped up from approximately four vehicles per month to more than 10 vehicles per month to achieve the delivery of the final vehicle by December 2010, in accordance with the original schedule.

Under the project, a total of 329 vehicles are due to be upgraded to the 18 tonne M113AS4 standard, and 21 vehicles will be upgraded to the 15 tonne M113AS3 standard. I would like to thank both Tenix and DMO for all of hard work in providing a way forward for this project.

Proving You Are Who You Say You Are

DVA has amended its proof of identity requirements so that people authorised to certify copies of original documents must now provide extra information.

Claimants lodging their first claim with the department are required to provide certain documents as proof of their identity (such as birth certificates). These may be the original document or a certified copy of the original document.

Under DVA's new arrangements, certifiers must now include their address and telephone numbers used during business hours on the certified copy.

Justices of the Peace and Commissioners for Declarations (States other than WA) are exempt from this requirement, but they must provide their registration number and the state in which they are registered.

DVA's general guidelines for people certifying copies of documents require that:

- certifiers come from the list of professions attached to the DVA claim form:
- the copy is marked with the words 'certified true copy';
- the copy is signed and dated;
- the certifier's name and profession or qualification is recorded:
- the certifier's address and telephone number during business hours is recorded.

The news is not good. Bruce was/is in an induced coma and although it is early stages the doctors have indicated that Bruce will be a paraplegic when it is all over, if not a quadriplegic.

This is really all the news that we have at this stage however, we thought it was important for you to be aware that Bruce has had a serious accident and he is obviously not in good shape.

Also on display was the new 'hot weather' ration pack, which the Defence Science and Technology Organisation designed for operations in tropical and hot environments.

The contents of the prototype ration pack are designed to require little or no heating and can be consumed while the soldier is on the move. Making rations easier to eat will help to ensure soldiers

are fit, well and energised while operating under challenging conditions.

"Ensuring Australian soldiers have access to the best technology is a priority of the Australian Government," Mr Snowdon said.

"A lot of behind-the-scenes research is undertaken across Defence to continually improve the equipment we provide to soldiers."

Designed to provide Parliamentarians with a personal and in-depth understanding of the work being done by Defence to enhance the protection and performance of Australian soldiers, the briefing covered a number of new technologies.

Technologies on display included nextgeneration camouflage uniforms, modular combat body armour, ballistics protection, personal role radios and a sophisticated thermal imaging rifle sight.

Background Information on the Defence Force Welfare Association Formed as the Regular Defence force Welfare Association, DFWA was established in 1959 as a direct response to the unfair and inequitable provisions then existing in the superannuation conditions for serving and former regular members of the ADF. It has since become a nationwide organisation concerned with the welfare and conditions of service affecting all serving and ex-serving members of the Australian Defence Force.

The Association's principal roles are;

- Advocating improved conditions of service for ADF members,
- Campaigning for fair and equitable treatment and retirement benefits for former ADF members, and
- Providing advocacy services on behalf of serving and retired personnel who may have a claim on Government under various Commonwealth legislation covering superannuation, compensation and veterans' entitlements.

The Association works closely with other ex-service organisations. It is a contributing member of the Australian Council of Public Sector Retiree Organisations, and the Australian Veterans' and Defence Services Council (AVADSC).

Underlying Principles for our Submission for the 2008-09 Budget

Two interconnected principles should guide the Government and form the philosophical context within which decisions on employment conditions for service men and women made. These are the 'unique nature of military service' and the need to compensate members of the Australian Defence Force (ADF) for that uniqueness in their pay,

superannuation, invalidity and death benefits, and other conditions of service. The following are the characteristics of military service which, when taken collectively, distinguish it sharply from employment in the broader Australian community.

The main characteristics of military service are:

- liability for combat operations leading to multiple deployments at short notice;
- a military discipline code;
- a regimented way of life;
- long and irregular working hours;
- retiring ages well below the community norms:
- high standards of physical fitness;
- frequent relocation; and
- separation from family.

In the above context the Defence Force Welfare Association (DFWA) believes the following areas outline issues where not only are the above principles ignored but in some instances subject serving and former ADF members to discriminatory treatment at the hands of the Government. We therefore submit the following policy proposals relating to the Government's support of serving and former ADF personnel for consideration in the 2008-09 Budget. All of the proposals in this submission have been raised with Ministers in the previous Government and only a brief explanation of each is included in the annex.

Proposed Budget Initiatives

Annex to DFWA 2008-09 Budget submission

Indexation of all military pensions using the general community standard of "the higher of MTAWE or CPI" as the indexation rate

Military pensions were originally indexed at CPI to maintain their relative value as income support for the pensioner. In the last 15-20 years. national standards of living have increased in real terms, which is not reflected if relying on the CPI. Acknowledging this in 1997 the then Government changed the method of indexing the Age/Service Pensions from CPI to a combination of CPI and Male Total Average Weekly Earnings (MTAWE). The parliament further extended this treatment to a whole range of payments to veterans earlier this year. Military retirement and disability pensions now stand out in being more harshly treated than almost every other payment subject to regular indexing to maintain their value. DFWA has analysed the cost of implementing this change and we believe the increase for FY 2006/2007 for example would have been less than \$18M. This figure is a mere 0.1 of one per cent of the 2006-07 budget surplus of \$17.3 billion and would remove a major discriminatory provision imposed on service men and women.

We ask that the same community standard of indexation be applied to all military pensions. Provisions of "Better Super" affecting military retirement and disability pensions Military pensions are paid from "untaxed" superannuation funds and, under the taxation changes introduced by the Better Super changes, those pensions are included in pensioners' total income for tax purposes. Contributions to DFRB/ DFRDB/MSBS were compulsory and contributors could not choose to pay or not pay tax on their contributions. There having been no choice it seems unfair to deny former ADF members taxfree pensions. The present provisions have an additional effect of taxing military pensions at the taxpayers' marginal rate, which puts them at a significant disadvantage when compared with taxpayers receiving pensions from "taxed" funds. This is another example of the "unique nature of military service" not being recognized by previous governments.

Proposal

We ask for the removal of income tax DFRDB/MSBS military superannuation including invalidity pensions in line with the most of the remainder of the Australian community but if that is not agreed to we ask for a separation of taxed military pensions from other taxed income on the taxpavers' tax return. Adoption of up to date life expectancy tables and restoration of the full pension after repayment of the lump sum commutation amount Military DFRDB pensioners who commute part of their pension into a lump sum have their pensions reduced permanently by an amount which is calculated to ensure that the lump sum is repaid when the pensioner reaches a life expectancy figure that has been calculated using the 1962 Life Tables. The continued use of these old out of date life expectancy factors unfairly reduces the retirement pension of the former ADF members subject to this treatment. Life expectancy has increased markedly since the DFRDB Scheme was introduced in 1972/3 yet the same out of date life tables continue to be used.

Proposal

To remedy this injustice we ask that:

- For current DFRDB pensioners, the full pension should be restored when the pensioner reaches life expectancy as defined in these tables; and
- The immediate adoption of up to date current Life Tables for all future retirees who are members of the DFRDB scheme.

Adjustments to Defence Widows' Pensions

Only a portion of Defence Widows' pensions is indexed and then only at CPI. That means their pension loses relative value even faster than it would have if the Defence pensioner had stayed alive. This is unjust on particularly vulnerable members of the community.

Proposal

We ask that all components of the Defence Widows' pension be indexed.

War Widows' pension offsetting

War Widows receive a lump sum on the death of their husband if killed on operational service. This is paid back out of the War Widow pension forever, even after they have repaid the original lump sum.

Proposal

We ask that the full payment amount be restored when the lump sum has been recovered.

Offsetting of special rate disability pensions under MRCS

A recipient of both a lump sum and an income stream paid as compensation for the same disability suffers a reduction in his/her income stream to offset the lump sum, even though it may have been payable under a

different Government scheme and that reduction continues throughout the life of the recipient and is never reduced, even when the lump sum has been paid back in full.

Proposal

We ask that the full payment amount be restored when the lump sum has been recovered.

102 "Coral" Battery: First Army Honour Title Awarded

The Honour Title Coral was awarded to 102 Field Battery, Royal Regiment of Australian Artillery, in recognition of its actions during the Vietnam War. Head of Regiment, Brigadier Phil Winter CSC, welcomed the award on behalf of the Army and gave credit to the outstanding actions of the unit during the long battle.

"This is an important day for the Australian Defence Force, and brings deserved recognition to the Gunners who fought so valiantly to hold their position in Vietnam 40 years ago," Brigadier Winter said.

"I welcome the title Coral on behalf of the Australian Army, and hope that the story of this battle provides inspiration to our current Diggers who are serving on operations today."

Today's ceremony forms part of a series of activities to commemorate the 40th Anniversary of the battles of Coral and Balmoral, which took place in South Vietnam during May and June of 1968 and played a significant role in securing Saigon from further attack.

For many years now the surviving members of the Platoon have been battling to have their record and role in the Vietnam War officially recognised.

It was announced that this long struggle has been bought to a conclusion by confirming that the Government and the Defence Department have been able to determine that the Platoon did indeed exist and engaged in a series of important actions in Vietnam as part of the Australian Task Force.

Particular tribute was paid to the courage and dedication of the men of the 2nd D&E Platoon. They were a team that was effectively born in battle, not having been formally raised and trained as a sub-unit in Australia before deploying to Vietnam, but being assembled in country in response to the particular security requirements of

the ATF. They were able to come together as an effective fighting force thanks to the professionalism of the soldiers and in particular the Non-Commissioned Officer who led them, Corporal James Bertram Riddle.

The action for which the 2nd D&E Platoon should particularly be noted for was the successful ambush they executed together with 2 Troop. B Squadron, 3rd Cavalry Regiment, in May 1969 at Thua Tich. This was a ferocious battle that involved the engaged troops taking on a much larger enemy force beyond artillery support and through many heroic individual and collective efforts were able to soundly defeat the enemy without loss. Their success was a tribute to their professionalism and the outstanding leadership and courage of Corporal Riddle whose personal actions ensured the survival of many members of the Platoon who would otherwise surely have been killed.

These proud veterans were advised that their role in the war would be forever enshrined and acknowledged in the Official History of the Vietnam War, which is soon to be published. The parliamentarians were privileged to have been able to meet with them personally and thank them for their service to the country and the Australian Army. They served and performed in the finest traditions of the Australian Defence Force and they will have an honoured place in its history. Education and training in the ADF will ensure that our future generations of Army leaders will have the opportunity to not only be aware of this legacy but to have the opportunity to learn from

What was achieved in high pressure time frames, from the time the unit was raised in Puckapunyal until the unit began its role of supporting the Centurions in SVN, following their arrival in late Feb 68, was a great credit to

those who made it happen and Bruce Dittmar was the OC coordinating that accomplishment.

In Nui Dat the endless walking about on rough surface aggravated Bruce's amputated toe stump (put his foot under a lawn mower in a PNG Wksp) and the MO declared him unfit for Nui Dat duty hence his transfer to 102 Fd Wksp (vice Brian Coulter) in mid 68.

Bruce served as Cfn in Korea and later saw service in PNG, Adelaide, RTC Bandiana Veh Wing, 1 Armd Regt LAD, SVN, 4 Base Wksp Bandiana then Corp transferred to RAAOC for his final posting as a Major in 31 Sup Bn Bandiana. Retirement saw him work in Howlong for a number of years before moving to Canberra after his civilian retirement.

Gap Year Marches On

Their brass was polished, their shoes were glossed and the creases on their uniforms pressed razor sharp as the latest group of Army Gap Year recruits lined up for their March Out Parade.

It was impossible to distinguish between the Gap Year and regular recruits as the hundred-strong parade marked the finish of 12 weeks' basic training.

Commandant of Army's Recruit Training Centre Colonel Bill Hanlon said the Gap Year participants were fully integrated and entitled to the same pay and benefits as any other member. "This is a unique opportunity for school leavers to sample Army life, as well as gain independence and skills while being paid," Colonel Hanlon said.

"It gives these young Australians space and resources to make good decisions about what they are going to do with their life," he said.

The Gap Year Program is part of the Government's \$3.1 billion commitment to boosting ADF recruitment and retention.

Members of the program have no obligation to Defence following the agreed 12-month term of employment.

The members are, however, entitled to a \$10,000 bonus if they re-enlist into the regular Army on completion of a civilian trade or tertiary qualification.

Colonel Hanlon said he was very pleased with the way the recruits had developed over the past three months.

"There are some very fine young Australian men and women marching out here today and they should be justly proud of what they have achieved so far." Colonel Hanlon said.

Members of the group will now go on to be trained in a specific employment stream before being posted to a Land Command unit.

A fresh look at the issues and barriers confronting women in the military is needed, and I will be seeking that from the women who know exactly why they joined, and why they've stayed.

The first consultative meeting will be held today, followed by many more around the country, and the comments and experiences will be fed back into the external reference group and into Defence's senior leadership.

The number of women in the ADF is the same today as it was a decade ago, and Government will be working with the service chiefs to see that situation improve.

An ADF that draws on the full potential of the Australian workforce will reflect

the diversity, ethnicity, and strengths of the nation, and at around 7000 women, Defence has a long way to go."

New Defence And Industry Eportal

It was recently announced that a new Defence and Industry ePortal would become operational at the beginning of July 2008.

The ePortal will incorporate, among other facilities, an Industry Capability

Information System that will contain publicly searchable data on the capabilities offered by Australian and New Zealand Defence companies.

This will allow Defence contractors to find Australian suppliers. It will also allow companies seeking partners with complementary capabilities to find each other.

It has been a longstanding problem to find easily accessible, accurate and current information on the capabilities of companies in the Defence industry sector.

When the Defence and Industry ePortal is launched in early July, it will be preloaded with data on about 400 Australian companies. New companies will be able to register as users, and then add their company capabilities to the database. Contractors looking for Australian partners will be able to search the database to find the capabilities they require.

This will greatly increase the opportunities for Australian Defence companies, particularly small to medium sized enterprises, to participate in Defence's acquisition and sustainment activities and also to compete in the global Defence market.

The Defence and Industry ePortal will also provide links to forthcoming Defence business opportunities and to other relevant Defence and Government sites.

It will also have a secure feedback tool to allow companies to provide feedback to Defence either on procurement matters or about the ePortal facility itself. The ePortal will provide access at all hours online.

A Robot Watchdog To Sniff Out Radiation

Australian scientists have developed a prototype remote-controlled robotic vehicle to detect radiation, the Minister for Defence Science and Personnel

announced recently.

This is a significant leap forward for Australia's defence and national security agencies.

It will greatly enhance our ability to respond to radioactive incidents.

The concept vehicle, known as RASP, for Remote Advanced Sensor Platform, was developed jointly by the Defence Science and Technology Organisation (DSTO) and the Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation (ANSTO).

It's small and light and can be operated from distances of up to 350 metres with full control of the robot.

It could be deployed in almost any area or location, from aircraft to cargo containers.

For the first time, we will also be able to provide our national security agencies with the ability to remotely identify the nature of the radioactive sources.

Emergency officers who detect the presence of radiation with their handheld instruments would be able to send in RASP and quickly discover if it has a half-life of several days or fifty thousand years.

Mid-year scenario trials will be taken at ANSTO. The scenarios will closely emulate a real event involving radioactive material.

General Giap was a brilliant, highly respected leader of the North Vietnam military. The following quote is from his memoirs currently found in the Vietnam

war memorial in Hanoi:

"What we still don't understand is why you Americans stopped the bombing of Hanoi. You had us on the ropes. But we were elated to notice your media was definitely helping us. They were causing more disruption in America than we could in the battlefields. We were ready to surrender. You had won!"

General Giap has published his memoirs and confirmed what most Americans knew. The Vietnam war was not lost in Vietnam — it was lost at home. The exact same slippery slope, sponsored by the US media, is currently well under way. It exposes the enormous power of a biased media to cut out the heart and will of the American public.

A truism worthy of note: Do not fear the enemy, for they can take only your life. Fear the media far more, for they will destroy your honour.
