

EDWARD (TED) KENNA VC

Defence is deeply saddened by today's passing of Edward (Ted) Kenna VC.

Enlisting in the Australian Imperial Force (AIF) in August 1940, Private Kenna VC served in the 23/21st Battalion in Victoria and later in Darwin.

Private Kenna was awarded the Victoria Cross on 15 May 1945 for his actions near Wewak, New Guinea, when he exposed himself to heavy fire, killing a Japanese machine gun crew and making it possible for his company's attack to succeed. Private Kenna then left the AIF in December 1946.

The Victoria Cross is the pre-eminent award for acts of bravery in wartime and is the Commonwealth's highest military honour. It is awarded to persons who, in the presence of the enemy, display the most conspicuous gallantry; a daring or pre-eminent act of valour or self-sacrifice; or extreme devotion to duty.

Vice Chief of the Defence Force, Lieutenant General David Hurley, paid tribute to Private Kenna VC.

"We continue to be humbled by Private Kenna's extraordinary courage and his legacy and dedication will never be forgotten by the Australian Defence Force.

On behalf of the Australian Defence Force, I extend our deepest sympathies to Ted's family during this difficult time," said Lieutenant General Hurley.

Chief of Army, Lieutenant General Ken Gillespie also expressed his condolences to Private Kenna's family and friends on behalf of the Australian Army.

"Ted was an inspiration to us all. His actions while serving in New Guinea epitomises the characteristics all soldiers strive for - bravery, loyalty and determination," Lieutenant General Gillespie said.

"His loss will be heavily felt by all members of the Army family. Our thoughts and prayers are with Ted's family at his time."

**AFGHAN TROOPS SEIZE
BOMB-MAKING CACHES**

Afghan National Security Forces, with support from Australian Special Forces and other coalition troops, have uncovered several major bomb-making factories and munitions caches in a town to the east of Tarin Kowt, near the Zabol province border.

The daylight raid on Sunday found more than five tonnes of ammonium nitrate, the key ingredient to the Taliban's home-made explosives. While Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) are a threat to coalition forces, Afghan civilians are often killed and wounded by indiscriminate IED emplacement.

The raid also seized almost 10,000 rounds of ammunition, 39 rocket-propelled grenades, a grenade launcher and automatic weapons, and a

significant amount of IED componentry.

The Deputy Chief of Joint Operations Command, Air Vice Marshal Greg Evans, said the cache was a major break-through in disrupting the manufacture of IEDs across the southern and eastern parts of Oruzgan province.

“The 5.3 tonnes of ammonium nitrate could have built several hundred Improvised Explosive Devices. It is a significant volume of material to be found in one location and its discovery and destruction will disrupt the ongoing road-side bomb emplacement campaign by the Taliban insurgents.”

The combined Afghan National Security Force and International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) operation took a day to clear the almost eight square kilometres of compounds and fields.

Air Vice Marshal Evans said that the removal of explosive material and its improvised components would make life safer for all Afghan people in Oruzgan and for the coalition troops who are supporting the Afghan National Security Forces.

“This operation highlights the commitment of Australian forces in Oruzgan to support the ISAF mission of protecting the population.”

Since January 2007, ISAF estimates that insurgents have caused 80 per cent of the civilian casualties in Afghanistan.

Air Vice Marshal Evans said the IED components had been destroyed and operations would continue in a bid to find further caches.

Across all Australian military campaigns, more than 1.8 million Australians have enlisted into the Services to serve their country in times of need. Of these, more than 102,000 have died as a result of their service, more than 225,000 were wounded, and more than 34,000 were held as prisoners of war.

More than 3,000 Australian Defence Force members are currently deployed on operations, continuing the ANZAC spirit whilst serving Australia's national interests at home and in many countries around the world.

"Our service men and women are doing an exceptional job contributing to the International Security Assistance Force mission in Afghanistan, contributing to various UN missions, and assisting and enhancing security and stability in our region," Air Chief Marshal Houston said.

Most of our deployed service personnel are in Afghanistan, other areas of the Middle East, East Timor, Solomon Islands and on border protection duties in Australia's maritime domain. Smaller numbers are deployed in Iraq, Egypt, Sudan and Darfur.

Air Chief Marshal Houston said the ANZAC spirit all lived on in the hearts and minds of Australians.

"Today we honour the courage and sacrifice of those who have contributed so much in shaping the identity of this proud nation," Air Chief Marshal Houston said.

"ANZAC Day is also a time to acknowledge the vital role of all those

who serve, or have served, on the home front, providing support and boosting the morale of their deployed loved ones," Air Chief Marshal Houston said.

STATE OF ENVIRONMENT REPORT FOR SHOALWATER BAY TRAINING AREA 2008

The Parliamentary Secretary for Defence Support, the Hon. Dr Mike Kelly AM MP and the Member for Capricornia, Ms Kirsten Livermore MP, today announced the release of the State of the Environment Report for Shoalwater Bay Training Area 2008, a Defence report which highlights the commendable environmental condition of the training area.

"The Shoalwater Bay Training area (SWBTA) in central Queensland is an important asset for Defence, effectively integrating blue water naval forces with comparable air and land assets in military training," Dr Kelly said.

"The State of the Environment Report is the result of years of research and monitoring and provides a single reference document about the environmental attributes of SWBTA. The Report identifies the area's natural and cultural values and states that they are well managed and in good condition," Ms Livermore said.

"Defence takes its responsibilities to the environment very seriously and strives to minimise the environmental impacts of day to day activities and operations," Dr Kelly said.

SWBTA is the largest coastal area with high wilderness values on the east coast

INQUIRY INTO RECOGNITION FOR SPECIAL AIR SERVICE REGIMENT DUTIES

The Parliamentary Secretary for Defence Support, the Hon. Dr Mike Kelly AM MP,

today announced that the Independent Defence Honours and Awards Tribunal will inquire into the recognition of Australian

Defence Force (ADF) service for Special Air Service Regiment (SASR) counter terrorist and special recovery duties.

"I am pleased that the Defence Honours and Awards Tribunal will inquire into the recognition of SASR duties," Dr Kelly said.

"This new inquiry represents a continuation of reviews into long standing Defence honours and awards issues identified by the Government in 2007."

As part of this inquiry, the Tribunal will also consider the service of other ADF elements seconded to the SASR in the past, and those that fulfill current counter terrorist and special recovery responsibilities.

A call for submissions was released to the national press on Saturday, 18 April 2009.

“Many people have written to me concerning recognition for SASR duties and I would encourage them to now take advantage of this opportunity to make a submission to the Tribunal,” Dr Kelly said.

Consider this “it's all your fault” rant by a woman who returned to Britain with an unexpected holiday souvenir: “My fiancé and I booked a twin-bedded room, but we were placed in a double-bedded room. We now hold you responsible for the fact that I find myself pregnant.” Her complaint and scores like it,

compiled by the Association of British Travel Agents and Thomas Cook, have done nothing to dispel the whingeing Pom cliché.

In one case, a British guest at a Novotel hotel in Australia made a fuss about his soup being too thick and strong. He had been supping from the gravy boat.

Another culinarily challenged traveller grumbled that “on my holiday to Goa in India, I was disgusted to find that almost every restaurant served curry. I don't like spicy food at all.”

Other British tourists found their holidays were spoiled because “the beach was too sandy” and “no one told us there would be fish in the sea; the children were startled”.

One disgruntled wife declared that topless sunbathing should be banned because her “holiday was ruined as my husband spent all day looking at other women”.

While Australians love a rant as much as the next ticked-off customer, they are more likely to see the funny side of a bad situation than British tourists, Flight Centre spokesman Haydn Long said.

“Australians tend to be a little bit more adventurous and when you take the more adventurous option, you tend to be more tolerant of things not always being perfect.”

Peter Hook, spokesman for the country's largest hotel group, Accor Asia Pacific, said Australians have a more laid-back attitude to travel because we've had to “overcome the tyranny of distance”.

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Boer War Memorial

The Boer War of 1899-1902 was the first war in which Australians served and died as part of a national contingent, but Australia has no national Boer War Memorial (BWM) in Canberra. The purpose of this email is to inform you of what is being done to establish one, and to ask your help in achieving it.

The Australian colonies federated in 1901, during the course of the Boer War. Before Federation, Australians served in contingents drawn from each colony (which then became the states in the new nation). At the war's end, as the site for

our national capital was not yet agreed there was no obvious site for a national memorial and each state set up a memorial for its own soldiers. By the time Canberra had been built as the capital, the losses of World War 1 were foremost in the minds of Australians and the Boer War essentially became the ‘forgotten war’. Both the Governor General and the CDF are patrons of the National Boer War Memorial and there are a variety of ways to become involved if you too are interested. If you (or anyone else you know) is a descendant of a Boer War veteran it is very simple to register this on the BWM website (<http://www.bwm.org.au/>). You can also help promote the cause just by discussing it with interested persons – the more people who know about it the better. Even better, you can also make a tax deductible contribution to the BWM fund, or sign on as a volunteer to work with your state committee (details on the website).

Although there are many competing demands on our time and wallets, this is an important cause – the Boer War was not only the first time Australia went to war as a nation, the nation actually came into existence during it. More Australians served and died in the Boer War of 1899-1902 than in any other conflict except the two World Wars. These are our military ancestors and we owe it to them to ensure they are not forgotten.

9FSB TO TEST NEW VEHICLE RANGE

SOLDIERS from 9FSB have been selected to and the Joint Strike Fighter project is to test drive a range of new medium/heavy weight Air Force vehicles as the evaluation for Phase 3 of Land 121's Project Overlander gets under way.

Several new medium/heavy weight vehicles are already lined up at Monegeeta Proving Ground, Victoria, ready for testing.

Program Manager Project Overlander Brig David O’Brien said the first stage of the selection process was a comparative evaluation to shortlist from four companies down to two.

“This will be based on the technical performance of each vehicle tested,” he said.

“Whatever we give the soldier it’s going to be the best we can.”

Brig O’Brien said four companies had provided vehicles to undergo rigorous trials at Monegeeta Proving Ground with a Defence test and evaluation team.

“Then we get soldiers into the cab,” he said.

9FSB soldiers will road test the trucks on a drive from Victoria to Townsville.

Brig O’Brien said the trucks would then be driven around HRTA to test them for operational purposes.

“The soldiers are very much a part of the trial,” he said.

“They will have to fill out checklists and comments on this vehicle and that vehicle and drive them all over the HRTA as well.”

According to Brig O’Brien, the trials will be fair to all contenders and conducted straight down the line. “We have some very good trucks,” he said. “And no doubt at the end the soldier will be satisfied and Army will get a great capability.”

Project Overlander is Army’s largest project and is as important to Army as the Air Warfare Destroyer project is to Navy

WHAT THE NEW TRUCKS HAVE TO OFFER.

Stall starts will become a thing of the past with all the new vehicles having automatic transmission.

Protected cab vehicles will have protection against projectiles and IEDs, and include air conditioning, suspension seating and room for stowage.

New vehicles are able to be fitted with modules to equip them for specialist roles including ambulance, command post, mobile workshop and general cargo transport among others.

Integrated load handling systems will be introduced to load shipping containers and special pallets without assistance, significantly reducing turn-around time.

About 5000 soldiers will be trained to operate the new vehicles by the time they roll out in 2013.

Farewell old mate

The Government has agreed to reform the way Defence is funded, to better align Defence funding with the costs of delivering the future force required for the defence of Australia and its immediate region. This involves a new funding model, which includes the continuation of 3% real growth in Defence funding to 2017/18, with a commitment to growth, in real terms, at 2.2% per annum beyond. This would maintain Defence funding at a broadly constant share of Australia's Gross Domestic Product.

"This is a necessary White Paper that brings with it essential reforms of how Defence is managed to delivers the Defence Force Australia needs and deserves," Mr Fitzgibbon said.

The 2009 Defence White Paper represents the most comprehensive statement on Defence ever produced. It affirms the Government's commitment to the defence of Australia, the protection of our sovereign interests and the security and stability of our region.

MEN'S HEALTH IN SPOT- LIGHT

THE CDF has joined a list of high profile Australians including singer and former Australian of the Year Lee Kernaghan and former rugby league player Gary Belcher to endorse International Men's Health Week 2009.

Men's Health Week runs from June 15-21 and is aimed to increase awareness of men's health issues. The theme for 2009 is preventative health and healthy behaviours men can adopt to improve their health and wellbeing. The sad reality is that every hour, five

men die of a preventative illness. The CDF appeared in a national television ad campaign which reminds men to see their GP once a year and to know their family history. He said Men's Health Week underscored the need for men to pay due regard to their health, both physical and mental. "All of us need to remember that it's important to have regular check ups and that we shouldn't be afraid to ask for help," ACM Houston said. "I am pleased that the Defence Honours and Awards Tribunal will inquire into recognition for service in Somalia. This inquiry is another in a series of reviews into long-standing Defence honours and awards issues identified by the Australian Government in late 2007," Dr Kelly said.

As part of this inquiry, the Tribunal will consider the establishment of a campaign medal for service in Somalia, recognition for HMAS Tobruk and HMAS Jervis Bay and recognition for 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, Group.

The Prime Minister and the Minister for Defence today released the most comprehensive Defence White Paper ever produced by an Australian Government.

“Representing over 14 months of hard work, involving all areas of Defence and the complete re-examination of Defence strategy, capabilities, business processes and resources, this is the most comprehensive White Paper ever released,” said Mr Fitzgibbon.

The new White Paper affirms the Rudd Labor Government’s commitment to the defence of Australia, the security and stability of the regional security environment, and a rules-based global security order.

The primary outcome of the White Paper is to build a future force required for the defence of Australia and the security of the immediate region. In meeting this aim, the existing force will be fixed to bring it up to its intended strength after years of under investment and over commitment by the former Liberal Government.

This White Paper confirms the centrality of the alliance relationship with the United States, and reaffirms Australia’s commitment to the United Nations system.

The White Paper notes the increasing uncertainty of the strategic environment, and better positions

Defence to respond to the broad range of possible conflicts and contingencies likely to impact upon Australia’s future security.

“The capabilities outlined in the White Paper will, over the next 20 years, create one of the most capable Defence forces in our region, with the world’s best people, equipment and support systems,” said Mr Fitzgibbon. “The Australian Defence Force we are creating will have access to leading edge technology, the finest equipment and the most professional and capable soldiers, sailors and air men and women.”

To achieve this, the Government has directed the most complex and far reaching reforms of Defence business ever undertaken, with the redirection of significant internal Defence financial resources to the development of new capability.

Fundamental reform to Defence personnel management arrangements will also take place through the creation of an integrated workforce that has the right balance of military, civilian and contract personnel. This will be combined with a new People Strategy that will drive a range of initiatives to recruit and retain the right people.

EASIER TO ACCESS**

ADF members with reserve service in their history will find it easier to get information together to support their

application under the Defence Home Ownership Assistance Scheme (DHOAS).
The Reserve and Employer Support Division (RES D) is now able to provide a means for individuals to obtain a record of their recorded days going back to the 1991-92 financial year. Records earlier than this will take a little longer to source and obtain. Head RES D Maj-Gen Greg Melick said the new system would prove more useful, meeting the needs of most ADF personnel with reserve service. “A single page recording service undertaken can be printed and attached to the application to confirm eligibility for DHOAS,” he said. DHOAS support is based on financial years of service only, whereas eligibility for Honours and Awards is based on enlistment and anniversary dates.

HIGHEST EAST TIMORESE HONOUR FOR ARMY OFFICERS

President of East Timor, His Excellency, Dr Jose Ramos Horta, yesterday awarded the Timor-Leste Medalha de Merito (Medal of Merit) to two Australian Army Officers for their service to East Timor during the past ten years.

Major General Mick Slater, DSC, AM, CSC, and Major Michael Stone, received the Medal at the President's Office in Dili. The Timor-Leste Medalha de Merito is the highest recognition that can be bestowed by the President of East Timor.

President Horta said Major General Slater's contribution to East Timor exemplifies the values of the Australian Defence Force and noted, in particular, his leadership of the International Stabilisation Force which was deployed in response to the break down in security in 2006.

Major-General Slater also received the Medalha Solidariedade de Timor-Leste (East Timor Solidarity Medal) during the presentation.

Major Stone was honoured for the unique role as a peacemaker he has played in East Timor during the past decade. President Horta said his profound understanding of Timorese culture and language has enabled him to promote peace and reconciliation throughout the country, gaining the respect of its people.

Both men accepted the medals at a small ceremony that was attended by guests including the Commander of the East Timor Defence Force, Brigadier Taur Matan Ruak, Australian Ambassador to East Timor, Mr Peter Heyward, and the Commander of the International Stabilisation Force, Brigadier Bill Sowry.

Major-General Slater, now Commander of the Army's 1st Division, led the Second Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment during the original Australian deployment into East Timor in 1999. He

Improved methods of detecting, warning and protection from chemical, biological and radiological weapons will become available from 2011.

Vehicles

The ASLAV upgrades remain in Land 112 Phase 4. The expected replacement program for land combat vehicles (Land 400) will appear in later plans. Additional phases have been added to Land 121 to deliver light protected vehicles, as well as vehicles to meet training requirements.

Gap crossing

There are plans to enhance Army's capability to cross a range of wet or dry gaps in support of combat operations (Land 155 Enhanced Gap Crossing). Subject to decision, initial operating capability is planned for 2016 to 2018.

Battlespace

Several programs – including JP 2044 Phase 4 (Digital Topographical Systems Upgrade), JP 2064 (Geospatial Information Infrastructure), JP 1770 (Rapid Environmental Assessment) and JP 1771 (Geomatic Support System) – are expected to enhance the ADF's ability to understand and exploit the battlespace.

Networking

Existing projects to network the ADF will continue. These include JP 2072 (Battlespace Communications System, Land), Land 75 (Battlefield Command Support), and JP 2089 (Tactical Information Exchange). Since the last Defence Capability Plan in 2006, there have been substantial changes to satellite communications as a result of joining the US Wideband Global Satellite program. The required ground infrastructure will be addressed in new phases of JP 2008 (Military Satellite Capability).

High hopes for hard and fast

The latest blueprint for Defence spending confirms a commitment to growth and, while Australian industry stands to benefit, the Army's aim is for the ultimate winners to be those in the front line.

THE Army is confident the Defence Capability Plan 2009 will boost its ability to hit hard and fast.

Unveiled on July 1, the \$60 billion plan includes new Steyr variants, networked mortars and new 155mm artillery, backed up by F-model Chinooks. Enhanced battlespace communications are also a priority.

Defence Minister John Faulkner said the openness of the plan would also help industry plan ahead and deliver on time.

Speaking at the Defence + Industry Conference in Melbourne, Senator Faulkner said a strong and effective ADF would require growth in both capacity and capability.

"The Government wants to ensure that Australian industry shares in that growth," he said.

The Government has promised to maintain 3 per cent real growth in the Defence budget until 2017, and 2 per cent growth from then until 2030. There is also an index-linked safety margin of 2.5 per cent.

"No other sector has such a solid predictable growth plan locked in for the future," Senator Faulkner said.

The big-ticket Army projects are:

Chinook replacement

Previous plans for piecemeal improvements have been ditched. The idea now is a wholesale replacement of the Army's existing D-model fleet with seven new Fmodel aircraft (Air 9000). Subject to a final decision in

2010-11 to 2011-12, the new fleet is expected to reach initial operating

capability between 2016 and 2018.

Indirect fire

The 105mm Hamel gun and M198 towed howitzer will both be replaced at the end of their service life by a mix of towed and self-propelled 155mm artillery. First-pass approval is complete and initial operating capability is scheduled for 2012 to 2014. A new project will link existing 81mm mortar capability into a joint fires environment using a networked ballistic calculator, and acquire advanced munitions (Land 136 Mortar Replacement). Some Reserve artillery units will also be equipped with a mortar capability. The planned upgrades are scheduled to take effect from 2014 to 2016, subject to a decision in 2012- 13 or 2014-15.

Body armour

As part of Land 125, soldiers will get improved modular body armour, as well as ballistic and eye protection to better shield them from blasts, projectiles and lasers. These are expected to be ready for use between 2011 and 2013.

Steyr rifle

The Steyr will be developed to commander, marksman, grenadier and standard variants. The enhancements are expected to improve target acquisition, probability of hit and cooperative engagement. The rifles are due to be ready for action by 2011 to 2013.

Non-lethal weapons

In peace-keeping operations, the ideal is to have the option of a nonlethal response. JP 3011 will develop weapons that should become available for operations between 2014 and 2016.

IEDs

JP 154 includes a "technology refresh" on methods of dealing with IEDs, and new ways of detecting them. The technology will start entering service from 2010.

Guns fire last shots

THE guns of 7 Fd Bty have fired for the last time, ending an era of 40 years of service in the Australian Army.

The M2A2 105mm howitzers were used in the Vietnam War and were brought across to the Army Reserve in 1976. Soldiers from the battery, which is part of Karrakatta based 13 Bde, fired the guns at the Lancelin training area last month. Despite inclement weather conditions, around 100 past members and families, including Vietnam veterans joined soldiers to witness a historic silencing of the guns. The battery now takes up a new role, utilizing 81mm mortars to replace the ageing artillery.

Bty Commander Maj Steve Mathers said it was a sad day for all involved.

"It is the start of a new era for 7 Fd Bty and we will be able to fulfil another important role for the Army Reserve," he said.

Commander 13 Bde Brig Stephen Cain said he was exceptionally impressed with the conduct of the final shoot.

"The professionalism of the soldiers in extremely trying weather conditions, demonstrated the capability of reservists to achieve standards of the highest level," he said. "The transition to mortars represents a great opportunity for reservists to maintain the capability of providing indirect fire support to the Army."

The completion of Operation CATALYST today accords with the date agreed with the Government of Iraq in December 2008 and reflects Iraq's improved levels of security and stability and the steady normalisation of our bilateral relationship.

The ADF maintains a small presence in Iraq comprising a detachment providing security to the Australian Embassy in Baghdad (Operation KRUGER) and two members directly supporting the United Nations mission in Iraq (Operation RIVERBANK).

In accordance with the CDF's Directive, troops returning from operation CATALYST at the end of their deployment

have been welcomed home by a senior member of the ADF. Major units have generally conducted Welcome Home activities including parades in local communities as part of their recognition of service at the close of their tour of duty.

Operation CATALYST force elements included; Battle Groups in Al Muthanna province and Dhi Qar province; the Royal Australian Navy led Iraqi Coastal Defence Force Training Team; Royal Australian Navy Major Fleet Units and embarked flights; the Australian Army Training Team - Iraq; personnel embedded in various coalition headquarters; combined logistics and communication elements; medical elements; Task Force 158 Fleet Battle Staff in the North Arabian Gulf; provision of personnel to the Coalition Air Operations Command; a RAAF P3-C Orion detachment; a RAAF C-130 Hercules detachment; a combat support element providing air traffic control; Defence civilian advisers in the Iraqi Ministry of Defence; and a Joint Task Force headquarters.

Under Operation CATALYST, Australian personnel were responsible for training approximately 36,000 members of the Iraqi Army, Navy and Marines, including the conduct of specialist training in logistics support, counter-insurgency operations and maritime interception and interdiction operations in protecting Iraq's vital offshore resources so critical to its economic future. Australian forces also had the honour of being involved in the first transfer of an Iraqi province, Al-Muthanna, to the provincial security control of Iraqi forces.

“Defence recognises the importance of harnessing the skills and experience of its qualified and professional men and women and is very much focused on enhancing its overall employment package to support retention,” Mr Combet said.

GUADALCANAL REMEMBERED

The Chief of Joint Operations, Lieutenant General Mark Evans, has today joined US State and Military officials to remember one of the most decisive campaigns to secure the South Pacific during World War Two.

Lieutenant General Evans said the landing of US Marines on Guadalcanal in August 1942 and the subsequent fighting in the Solomon Islands was a critical factor in halting the Japanese advance.

“Sixty seven years ago these islands were the site of some of the most decisive battles that turned the tide in the Pacific campaign,” Lieutenant General Evans said.

“And today it is pleasing to see our American allies continuing to engage with the Solomon Islands Government and people so long after the days of World War Two.”

The US Military-led Pacific Partnership program for 2009, which focuses on increasing Pacific Islanders’ access to engineering and medical services, commenced work in the region yesterday.

“The program is an important example of ongoing international engagement with

the Solomon Islands, and one of which Australia is proud to be a part,” Lieutenant General Evans said.

Completing his visit to the Solomon Islands, Lieutenant General Evans met with Australian troops serving in the Combined Task Force of the Regional Assistance Mission to Solomon Islands (RAMSI).

“The work that you and your colleagues from throughout the region are doing here is enormously beneficial to the people of the Solomon Islands,” Lieutenant General Evans said.

“RAMSI has made great strides in bringing security and stability to the Solomon Islands and is something the whole region can be proud of.”

DEFENCE FORCE SEPARATION RATE LOWEST IN DECADE

Greg Combet, Minister for Defence Personnel, Materiel and Science today announced that the Australian Defence Force (ADF) is currently experiencing its lowest separation rate in the last decade, with the 12-month average separation rate falling to 9.4 per cent in July 2009.

"The Navy, Army, and Air Force have experienced significant decreases in separation rates with current figures of 10.8, 10.3 and 6.4 per cent respectively, down from 12.4, 11.9 and 9.0 per cent since July 2007," Mr Combet said.

"The ADF is expecting further decreases in separation rates throughout the next quarter, followed by the rates stabilising in 2010."

"Another pleasing aspect of this result is that more young people are getting first class training from the ADF at a time when Australia needs to build its workforce skills base."

Mr Combet said the decrease in separation rates, and associated increased retention of trained and skilled personnel with operational experience, will place Defence in a good position to achieve the growth and capability requirements outlined in the 2009 Defence White Paper, Force 2030.

ADF personnel strength is currently 56,522, representing a growth of 1,919 permanent members over the last year and including 1,454 Reservists on full time service. This growth includes 259 more women than last year serving in a wide variety of roles. The ADF has also benefited greatly from the re-enlistment of personnel with prior military service.

AFGHAN TROOPS SEIZE BOMB-MAKING CACHES

Afghan National Security Forces, with support from Australian Special Forces and other coalition troops, have uncovered several major bomb-making factories and munitions caches in a town to the east of Tarin Kowt, near the Zabol province border.

The daylight raid on Sunday found more than five tonnes of ammonium nitrate, the key ingredient to the Taliban's home-made explosives. While Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) are a threat to coalition forces, Afghan civilians are often killed and wounded by indiscriminate IED emplacement.

The raid also seized almost 10,000 rounds of ammunition, 39 rocket-propelled grenades, a grenade launcher and automatic weapons, and a significant amount of IED componentry.

The Deputy Chief of Joint Operations Command, Air Vice Marshal Greg Evans, said the cache was a major break-through in disrupting the manufacture of IEDs across the southern and eastern parts of Oruzgan province.

“The 5.3 tonnes of ammonium nitrate could have built several hundred Improvised Explosive Devices. It is a significant volume of material to be found in one location and its discovery and destruction will disrupt the ongoing road-side bomb emplacement campaign by the Taliban insurgents.”

The combined Afghan National Security Force and International Security

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Assistance Force (ISAF) operation took a day to clear the almost eight square kilometres of compounds and fields.

Air Vice Marshal Evans said that the removal of explosive material and its improvised components would make life safer for all Afghan people in Oruzgan and for the coalition troops who are supporting the Afghan National Security Forces.

“This operation highlights the commitment of Australian forces in Oruzgan to support the ISAF mission of protecting the population.”

Since January 2007, ISAF estimates that insurgents have caused 80 per cent of the civilian casualties in Afghanistan.

Air Vice Marshal Evans said the IED components had been destroyed and operations would continue in a bid to find further caches.

TEN-YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF INTERFET

Today marks the 10th Anniversary of the Australian-led International Force for East Timor (INTERFET), which deployed to Dili on 20 September 1999 to restore peace and security.

Reflecting on the success of the mission, Minister for Defence Senator John Faulkner, paid tribute to the courage and professionalism of Australian and coalition troops who rapidly worked to assist the fledgling nation and prevent further bloodshed.

“The speed and effectiveness of Australian forces in stemming the violence during the early days of INTERFET bears testimony to the quality and professionalism of Australian troops.”

At its height, around 5,700 Australian troops consisting of three infantry battalion groups and a headquarters were deployed as part of the INTERFET mission, making it the largest deployment of Australian troops since Vietnam. Australian forces were ably supported by troops drawn from 21 regional and international partners.

“All INTERFET veterans, many of whom were deployed more than once to East Timor, should be particularly proud of the contribution they have made to regional security efforts”, the Minister for Defence said.

“They served their country with distinction and on the 10th Anniversary of INTERFET, we recall and honour their service.”

Australian troops from every state and territory, both regular and reserve, have served in East Timor. Over the last ten years, approximately 44,000 individual deployments to East Timor have occurred, and of these, around 2,200 have been women.

The work of INTERFET and its successor missions have been crucial in establishing the security conditions necessary for nation building efforts.

“Australia looks forward to a continued partnership with the government of East Timor, the United Nations and the international community to further consolidate stability in East Timor.”

FROMELLES EXCAVATION SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETED

Greg Combet, Minister for Defence Personnel, Materiel and Science, today announced that the archaeological excavation at Pheasant Wood, Fromelles, France has now successfully concluded.

“A total of 250 sets of remains and 1200 artefacts have been excavated from six graves. This is lower than the previous estimate of 300 remains,” said Mr Combet.

“An early analysis of the remains and the artefacts indicates that a large number of those recovered appear to be Australian.”

The focus of the project will now fall upon the identification of the remains and their reinterment at the purpose-built Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military cemetery.

“As part of the identification of the remains LGC Forensics is undertaking a comprehensive analysis of DNA samples taken from the remains to assist in DNA matching against living relatives,” Mr Combet said

“In conjunction with this process further analysis of artefacts and remains will continue throughout September and October at Oxford Archaeology’s on site laboratory to see if any evidence can assist with the identification process.

“This information will be presented to the Joint Identification Board in March 2010 where the British and Australian Governments will consider the results and determine any appropriate further action that should be taken.

“While identification of the remains is an extremely complex process I remain hopeful that we will be able to identify a number of those that we have found.

“As the formal identification is a complex process that may take many months, and in some cases years, every soldier will be buried initially without a permanent headstone.

“The burials will commence on 30 January 2010 and continue through February until every soldier is laid to rest with full military honours. Members of the public are welcome to visit the site during reburials and view the proceedings from outside the cemetery.”

A commemorative event to open the cemetery is scheduled for the 94th anniversary of the Battle of Fromelles on 19 July 2010.

“I would like to take this opportunity to thank Oxford Archaeology, and all of their staff, for their hard work and dedication throughout this excavation. Both the Australian and British Governments have been very pleased with their performance,” said Mr Combet.

'TIGER' ACHIEVES MAJOR MILESTONE FOR ARMY

Greg Combet, Minister for Defence Personnel, Materiel and Science today announced the achievement of a major milestone in project AIR 87, the Tiger Armed Reconnaissance Helicopter project.

The Initial Operational Test and Evaluation Readiness milestone marks the point where the project transitions focus from individual flying, maintenance and support qualifications to collective training and development of Army Aviation warfighting skills.

"This is a critical milestone in the development of this important capability which will provide Army and the Australian Defence Force with one of the most technologically advanced combat helicopters in the world," Mr Combet said.

"The crews of the 1st Aviation Regiment in Darwin will now focus on team training with multiple aircraft, and utilising the sensors and outstanding weapon systems of the Tiger in the combined arms environment of the landforce battlespace.

"The Tiger is made of high strength

lightweight composite materials and it incorporates a number of cutting edge technological and digital systems that required extensive certification and integration efforts by both the Commonwealth and the prime contractor, Australian Aerospace.

"The integration of the US Hellfire missile system to the Tiger has been very successful, providing the aircraft with exceptionally accurate firepower out to eight kilometres by day and night.

"Based on the Australian success integrating the Hellfire missile, France has announced their intention to fit this weapon system to their next version of the Tiger helicopter.

"One of the key features of the Tiger is that weapons targeting information is displayed directly onto the pilot's visor. The cannon can also be controlled through the helmet which points it in the same direction that the pilot is looking. This reduces the time needed to engage a hostile threat during low level reconnaissance missions.

"I congratulate Australian Aerospace, the Defence Materiel Organisation and the Army personnel who worked many long hours to introduce this highly complex but most capable level of military equipment," said Mr Combet.

Australian flight test and operational crews have now flown over 4300 hours and fired 16 hellfire missiles, 475 rockets and 4000 rounds of the 30 millimetre canon. The Australian Tiger is closely related to the helicopters being provided by Eurocopter to France, Germany and Spain.
