Welcome to the pre AGM Horses Mouth.



She was reformed from the Karrakatta EME Pool on 1 Oct 1948 as 2 Medium Workshop and despite various name changes (113 Inf Wksp, 5 EME Svces Unit etc.) and a couple of changes of location (Artillery Barracks) has been going continuously ever since

Her parents:

113 Independent Wksp was first formed in QLD in 1942 and thence went to Port Moresby, Morotai and finally ended up in the Solomons until the end of the war

2 Medium Workshop has an even longer history. In WWI on the Western Front, Australian tradesmen were originally transferred into British units but in late 1918 the British officers and CFN were removed and these became full Australian units under the 1st AIF. In our case the British 17 Mobile Ordinance Workshop became the Australian 2 Mobile Workshop (Medium)

WA RAEME Western Front Tour 2019

Following a couple of enquiries made at ANZAC Day the Committee is looking at the possibility of a RAEME Centric tour of the southern UK and the Western Front. The intent is that we will visit more technology related sites and museums which the usual "battlefield type" (i.e. grunt) tours do not go. Nevertheless there will be detailed tour of the main Australian "sights" on the Western Front.

???Did You Know???

Atomic Annie

The was the only nuclear artillery shell ever actually fired in the U.S. nuclear weapons test program was on May 25, 1953 at the Nevada Test Site. Fired as part of Operation Upshot–Knothole and codenamed Shot GRABLE, a 280 mm (11 inch) shell with a gun-type fission warhead was fired 10,000 m (6.2 miles) and detonated 160 m (525 ft) above the ground with an estimated yield of 15 kilotons.

The shell was 1384 mm (4.5 ft) long and weighed 365 kg (805 lb). It was fired from a special, very large artillery piece, nicknamed "Atomic Annie", built by the Artillery Test Unit of Fort Sill, Oklahoma and was based on the German K5 Railway gun. The warhead was designated the


W9 nuclear warhead and 80 were produced in 1952 to 1953 for the T-124 shell. It was retired in 1957.



V3 Guns

The V3 gun was a German World War II supergun working on the multi-charge principle whereby secondary propellant charges are fired to add velocity to a projectile.

Construction began in September 1943 and consisted of five drifts which were to hold a stacked cluster of five gun tubes, for a total of 25 guns. The entire battery would be able to fire up to 10 shots a minute, capable in theory of hitting London with 600 projectiles every hour. Each drift was oriented on a bearing of 299°, to the nearest degree – a direct line on Westminster Bridge. Although the elevation and direction of the guns could not be changed, it would have been possible to alter the range by varying the amount of propellant used in each shot. This would have brought much of London within range.



Land 400 Phase 3 - M113 APC Replacement

The multi-billion dollar project to replace Army's M113 Armoured Personnel Carriers has taken another step forward with the formal release of the Request for Tender for LAND 400 Phase 3 – Mounted Close Combat Capability.

Minister for Defence Senator the Hon Marise Payne said the project will see Army's capability significantly enhanced with a fleet of up to 450 modern Infantry Fighting Vehicles and 17 Manoeuvre Support Vehicles.

"This will be the largest investment in Army's capability ever undertaken and will provide our troops with a modern close combat capability," Minister Payne said.

"The vehicles will be equipped with high levels of protection, firepower and mobility that will enable sustained operations, varying from peacekeeping to close combat."

Defence is placing greater emphasis on a coordinated and programmatic approach to Army's biggest project ever.

A new Armoured Vehicle Division will been created to consolidate large programs like LAND 400, LAND 907 – Main Battle Tank Replacement and LAND 8160 – Enhanced Gap Crossing Capability into a programmatic 'mega project'.

When fully delivered, the LAND 400 Program will allow Army to successfully sustain mounted close combat operations against emerging and future threats as part of a joint force.

RAEME Corps History Rwanda Operation Tamar 1993-1996

RAEME members were deployed on OP TAMAR - United Nations Assistance Mission for Rwanda (UNAMIR). The operation was 12 months in duration broken into two six month deployments.

Rotation 1 consisted of a medical company, an infantry company group - A Coy from 2/4 RAR, four Armoured Personnel Carriers from B Sqn 3 / 4 Cav, and a logistic support company from various Townsville units, and a combat engineer team from 3 CER. Rotation 2 was supported by B Coy 2 RAR.


OP TAMAR was the Australian Medical Support force to UN troops deployed to RWANDA during UNAMIR II. It was deployed to support the UN forces in Rwanda who were trying to restore peace after a vicious civil war that included large scale ethnic cleansing.

The workshop was established from Technical Support Platoons and Troops from 3 Brigade including 2/4 RAR, 3 CER, 3 BASB and B Sqn 3 /4 Cav Regt backed by equipment and stores from 3 BASB and B Sqn 3 / 4 Cav including a fitters track, a GMV and an ERV.

RAEME Involvement.

The advance party took control of the hospital in the capital city Kigali, it was surrounded by RPA (Rwandan Patriotic Army) bases and not defendable if attacked. On arrival at the hospital, the destruction and slaughter was evident. A week was spent cleaning and repairing the hospital. The RAEME Team worked to get two old and disused generators running and provided safe power to the hospital buildings and operating theatre.

Over the following weeks several generators were repaired and rewiring jobs to community sites and NGO (Non Government Organisations) hospitals, in particular was the Medecins Sans Frontieres hospital. The resourcefulness of the RAEME team had them scrounging parts to keep the generator going allowing the doctors to operate for the first time time with reliable power, which saved many lives.

The main workshop arrived and consisted of 11 personnel and commenced setting up the workshop in the central parade ground of the officer training school ground, which would be home for the next six months. The vehicle workshop / GE was a 20 x 40 tent with power provided by the Lincoln generator / welder, the RPS and EME Ops were situated in adjacent buildings. Tropical downpours meant stopping work and finding somewhere dry.

FRT's would often be deployed to outlying areas in support of the medical teams, with infantry support usually in Land Rover 6x6 or Unimog trucks. The danger and uncertainty was magnified by no communications, no fire support, no air medical evacuation, Vietnam era body armour and support staff were only issued 60 rounds of ammunition. The main muscle was the three gun car APCs and the Fitters Track, which were banned from driving on public roads shortly after arriving, as they were wrecking the roads.
