???Did You Know???

New Army Rank - Specialist

The trial of the Specialist insignia rank slide is perhaps the most significant change to Army's Other Ranks structure since the rank of staff sergeant was discontinued in the 1990s.

The black vertical line with one horizontal white stripe is currently being used to designate specialists who are being remunerated at the private/craftsman to sergeant pay rates.

Specialists can advance to WO2 and WO1 equivalency, however, they will wear WO2 and WO1 rank slides

The Specialist Service Soldier Trial is exploring how Army can enhance its workforce through long-term access to personnel with highly technical skills who are best kept with their hands literally on-the-tools for their military career.

The introduction of the Specialist insignia helps to differentiate the specialist's function and employment model, allowing them to be recognised for their technical skills rather than command and control roles.

The trial is helping Army better understand the employment architecture required to support a specialist workforce, including career pathways that seek to constantly keep this workforce employed using skillsets normally found at the manufacturer or contractor level.



Return of the SLR

The SLR is due to return to the British Army!!!

After 35 years out of circulation, the famous Self Loading Rifle is due to return to service for British Army Troops.

The SLR-A2, a 7.62mm weapon, will feature a modernised rail system and extended 30-round magazine.

This change comes after years of continuous failings of the Army's current weapon system, the SA80, which was found to be much less powerful.

"We had a major issue with stopping power with the SA80" said Lt Gen Ian Wallace, Deputy Director of Defence Armaments, "The weapons system was simply not powerful enough to put down the enemy. With the new SLR-A2, you can guarantee that it will not fail with that task."

While there is no current date announced for its integration, the news of the SLR's return has been met with approval by both serving soldiers and veterans alike.

Now where did they get that from?

Jodrell Bank Radio Telescope

When Sir Bernard Lovell started his pioneering work on radio astronomy immediately after WWII, he relied on a lot of ex-military war surplus radio equipment (including used a gun laying radar to study cosmic rays) He soon realised that in order to really progress a fully steerable telescope would need to be professionally designed and constructed;

Always on the lookout for a bargain, in 1950 he managed to get the two circular 15" turret drive gear sets and associated pinions from 15-inch (38-cm) gun turrets were bought cheaply in 1950; these came from the World War I battleships HMS *Revenge* and *Royal Sovereign*, which were being broken up at the time.^[12] The bearings became the two main altitude rotator bearings of the telescope, with the appropriate parts of the telescope being designed around them.



The consequent Mark 1 telescope (now renamed the Lovell Telescope) when completed in 1957, was the largest steerable dish radio telescope in the world at 76.2 m (250 ft) in diameter; even now it remain the third-largest in the world and is still in constant use.



It is amazing to think that two sets of turret traversing gear, built in 1913 to fight the High Seas Fleet could still be in constant use today in what is still one of the world's most precise scientific instruments. A true example of "gees they made'em good in those days" It did however make the wonder just what other bits of precision machinery have well outlasted their parent ship. Here are a few examples from famous ships of WWII

HMS Hood

• Two of Hood's 5.5" secondary guns which were removed in a 1934 refit are still emplaced at Fort Bedford on Ascension Island.





HIJMS Mitsu

• A twin 16" turret which was removed from the Mitsu in 1932 remains on display in the grounds of the former Imperial Japanese Naval Academy at Etajima



KMS Gneisenau


• A triple 11" turret was removed in 1943 and emplaced Austrått Fort in Ørland, Norway and was kept operational until 1968.



• A twin 5.9" secondary turret was removed at the same time and remains in situ at Sevnsfort in Denmark. This mounting was reduced to reserve status in 1984, but continued to be fired every year during training exercises. They "were fired for the

last time in the summer of 2000, ending their operative career with an HE war-shot from turret no 1, driven 17 kms into the Baltic Sea and raising a column of spray to a height of 150 m, the shell detonating at an approximate depth of 17-18 m, according to the commander of the fort at the time." The fort was officially deactivated in 2001 and now exists solely as a museum.
